The American Association of Junior Colleges (AAJC) has changed its name to American Association of Community and Junior Colleges (AACJC).

Including the word "community" in the 52-year old organization's name more accurately reflects the kinds of institutions represented and the purpose of the association.

Mt. Hood is a member—one of 724 publicly supported two-year colleges under the umbrella.

Board member Sedley N. Stuart was recently elected to a position on the association's board of directors.

Mt. Hood president, Dr. Earl L. Klapstein, has also served on the AACJC board.

Edmund J. Gleazer, Jr., AACJC president, explains the name change, "Most two-year colleges today are community oriented, no matter what they call themselves. They have as their goal to put college within commuting range of their total communities."

"In fact," Gleazer noted, "many journalists have dubbed the institutions the 'people's colleges' or 'democracy's colleges'... they have earned these labels by providing varied curriculums, both academic and job oriented, and by keeping direct costs to students at a minimum."

A majority of the more than 1,100 community and junior colleges now in operation are members of the national association.

The AAJC was organized in 1920 to provide national professional leadership and direction for the then fledgling "junior college movement."
