

# Community schools come to Sandy area schools

What is a Community School? It is an education program for the whole community which makes full use of the existing school structures. 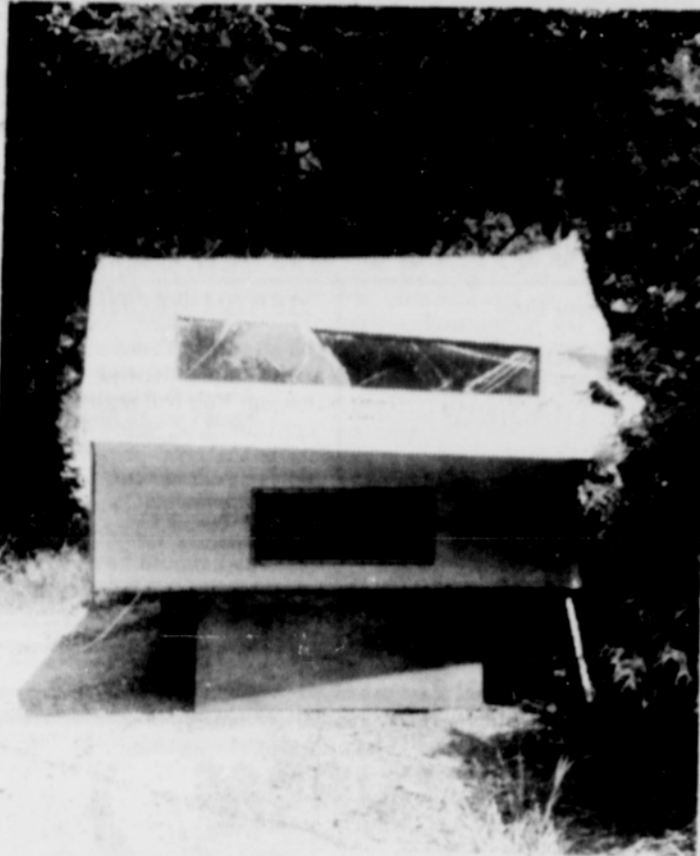
are who are not certified teachers, but who have knowledge or skills which they can share with others. These are the potential leaders who will be needed.

The programs will be scheduled according to the needs of the community. A survey will be taken to find these needs out.

Besides general interest courses, the school will also offer GED and college credit classes on demand. For the general interest subjects, the fee is nominal, \$5 to \$3. The college credit classes will be the same rate as on campus. Community Schools are sponsored by Mt. Hood Community College through the grade schools. They are en-

dorsed by National P.T.A. Mt. Hood has a representative in this area, Sue Monnes, who will divide her time between Sandy and Welches.

A community advisory board, composed of volunteers, will be selected to serve. Mt. Hood expects to have a portable office in Sandy near the grade school library about Aug. 1. Presently, most school buildings are used only 30 per cent of the time by only 40 per cent of the people. Community Schools hopefully will improve these figures.

## RECREATION REPORT

The Zig Zag Ranger District says that there is still good skiing at Timberline and that the Neighborhood Youth Corps has been working at various projects in the Zig Zag area.

Announcements by the Zig Zag and Clackamas Ranger Districts include the following:

**ROADS**  
In the Clackamas Ranger District, all roads are open except Skyline Road S42 between Olallie Lake and Breitenbush Lake because of snow; S701 between Graham Pass and Cachebox Meadows because of snow and road construction; and S639 which is closed by a slide.

There are no roads closed in the Zig Zag area.

The Zig Zag district has announced that S32 to Kinsal Lake is now open all the way.

**CAMPGROUNDS**  
The following Clackamas campgrounds are still snowed in: Peninsula, Horseshoe Lake, and Breitenbush. However, the snow is melting rapidly and these areas should be open soon. All other campgrounds are open and the district requests that campers read the bulletin boards to learn the campground regulations.

In the Zig Zag District, the Summit Rest Area will be temporarily closed in the near future for complete renovation. Nanitch Campground is now free of snow and Alpine and Phlox are still snowbound.

Others open are Camp Creek, Green Canyon, McNeil, Tollgate, Riley, Still Creek, Barlow, Twin Bridges, Devil's Meadow, and Nanitch.

**TRAILS**  
In the Clackamas District, the following trails are open to use:

Elk Lake, Round Lake, Alder Flat, Shellrock, Fish Lake, Riverside, Anvil Lake, Pyramid Lake and Buck Lake. Fish Lake has not been maintained and Elk Lake has been maintained for 1 1/2 miles.

Trails closed to motor vehicle use include Elk Lake, Round Lake, Alder Flat, Fish Lake and Riverside.

In the Zig Zag District, the Skyline Trail from Lolo Pass to the Sandy River and from Timberline to Barlow Pass is now open. Other sections are blocked by snow.

The Hidden Lake trail can be hiked as for as the lake and Hunchback still has too much

snow to make it to Devil's Peak. Paradise Park can be hiked up for about four miles.

Other trails completely open are Burnt Lake, Castle Canyon, Cast Lake, Cool Creek, Flag Mountain, Mirror Lake, Pioneer Bridge, Plaza Ridge, Ramona Falls, Salmon River, Old Salmon River, Still Creek, Horseshoe Ridge, and Zig Zag Mountain Loop.
