Start Looking Now

The Sandy city council needs to act now to get the ball rolling towards the selection of a city administrator.

The position becomes effective on Jan. 1, 1973. Viewing the recent experiences to hire a new high school superintendent and fire chief in the area, the council must realize that the selection process could take months.

At their last meeting on July 17, the council indicated they were thinking of waiting until after the fall council elections before looking for a city administrator.

We feel this attitude is wrong. The council needs to form a screening committee and start now in advertising for applicants.

During the weeks which the ap-

plicants apply, the council could be outlining the exact duties of this new position.

It will take several weeks, we suspect, for the screening committee to narrow the candidates down to as few as five.

From this number the council could then make the final selection.

We feel this whole process could go on until even after the fall elections.

It is important to start looking now to make sure the city gets well qualified persons applying for the job.

The council will discuss this issue at their Aug. 7 meeting and we encourage them to get the ball rolling. The meeting will start at 8 p.m. at the city hall.

Citizens Get Involved

There is a need for a screening committee to help the city council make the decision on a city administrator.

We suggest to the council that they look towards the residents of the city to help them on this committee. And

hopefully the residents will form a majority on the screening committee.

The residents of Sandy showed their interest in the issue during the recent budget elections and now the council can call on them to "get involved."

A "New" Agnew?

Vice-Pres. Spiro Agnew spoke to the newspaper convention in Portland last week and his remarks were entirely uncontroverted. He was completely a model of decorum.

Is this a new Agnew?

Probably not. It is perfectly obvious that Pres. Nixon is toning down Agnew's rhetoric so the vice-president doesn't stir up too much dissent.

A hard-line Agnew probably would do much to unite the Democrats and this is the last thing Pres. Nixon wants. In fact, Agnew has said he plans to discuss issues, not per-

sonalities.

His remarks here last week followed a prepared script almost to the word. Only a few introductory jokes, (the "Festival of Lettuce" in Miami etc.) and in some off-the-cuff remarks right at the end did he deviate from the script.

It was almost as if Agnew had been given his lines and that was it.

Frankly, we prefer the "old" Agnew even though his remarks lopped off many newspaper heads in the process.

Even if we didn't agree with what he said, it was fun listening.

Agnew Well Protected

A sidelight to Agnew's visit was the visible protection given the vice-president.

Portland police and secret service were in great numbers and well

armed. This included several policemen with machine guns.

It's too bad that in a free country such as ours we have created such a need for protection.

The boy, Jim Mule, called to his fellow swimmers who held him up and helped bring him back to shore. The others were Chuck Fenton, Dave Furman and Terry Graham. Furman is Gresham High student, the others attend school at Troutdale.

Mule, after making it back to shore, was unharmed. Owen Graham of Wood Village is the Scoutmaster.

Jaycees meet

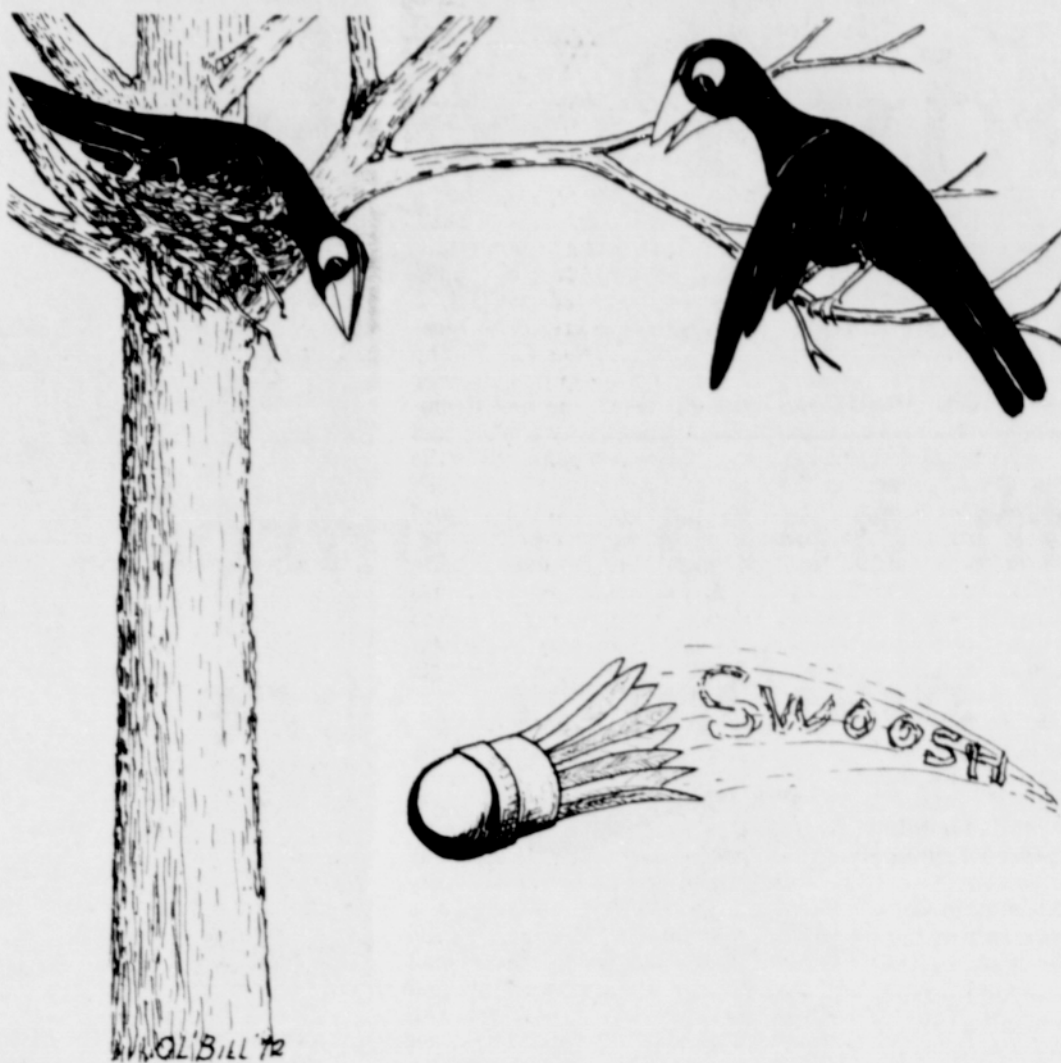
