A program to improve the pay, fringe benefits and working conditions of Oregon's 32,000 state employees has been adopted by the Board of Directors of the Oregon State Employees Association.

Called a "program for progress," it sets forth a list of priority goals for state employees and OSEA covering such subjects as pay, retirement benefits, insurance, travel and subsistence, collective bargaining, political action and personnel administration.

Most of the goals, particularly those bearing a price tag, will require action by the 1973 legislature. Others can be accomplished by negotiations between OSEA and Gov. Gom McCall's Executive Department.

The OSEA board issued the following statement when it adopted the program:

"The 1973 session of the Oregon Legislative Assembly is less than six months away. Most of the economic benefits received by state employees result from legislative action. A successful legislative program grows out of intelligent ad-

What's Cooking?

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

1/2 cup peanut butter
1/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup white sugar
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup sifted flour
1 egg, well beaten
Cream peanut butter and shortening together. Add sugar gradually, continuing to cream until mixture is light and fluffy. Add beaten egg. Sift flour and soda together; add, mix well. Drop mixture, one level teaspoon at a time on cookie sheet. Press down with tines of a fork. Press a second time so that creases are at right angles. Bake 10-15 minutes in a moderate oven, 350 degrees. Yield 4 1/2 dozen cookies. These freeze well.—From the files of Mrs. Ray G. Bahe, Sandy.

DREAM BARS

Place 1 layer whole graham crackers on bottom of large pan (9" x 13" or larger). Melt 1 cup butter or margarine. Add 1 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 1 egg slightly beaten. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to full boil. Cool slightly and add 1 cup coconut, 1 cup chopped nuts and 1 cup graham cracker crumbs. Pour over graham cracker crust carefully, then add another layer of whole graham crackers and frosting. For frosting use 2 cups sifted powdered sugar, 1/2 cube butter and enough cream or milk to make spreading consistency. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla if desired. Place in refrigerator until cool and set. Cut into squares. Store in covered container in refrigerator. Very good!—From the files of Mrs. T. Raymond Yandell, Salem.

Grease a 13" x 9" or a 13" x 13" pan. Put crushed pineapple and juice in pan, then pie filling. Scatter nuts and coconut over these fruits. Then put 1 box of white or yellow cake mix (dry) over all. Extension programs grow at Mt. Hood CC

More than 10,000 East Multnomah County citizens took advantage of Mt. Hood Community College extension courses during the past year.

Dr. Clifford O. Denney, MH-CC vice president of development, reported to the college board of education that more than 200 different courses were offered in some 20 locations throughout the district, as well as at the college.

"The philosophy of Mt. Hood's extension program is something for everyone," Roger McDowell, associate dean of extension services, commented.

Senior citizens find the extension program an outlet for their free time and an opportunity for enrichment.

Others attend to reinforce skills, work toward a degree while working during the day, or to pick up special educational requirements.

The total extension program includes course offerings in college transfer curricula, cultural enrichment, occupational preparation and occupational extension.

Most classes are held in the evening and great use is made of the district's nine high schools.

It all began in the spring of 1967 when some nine courses were offered at local churches

and Gresham High School. Some 863 classes were offered this past year.

Examples of rapid growth are evidenced at Parkrose High School which has gone from two courses in 1968 to 102 this year; Reynolds High School with 47 offerings in 1968 and 129 this year; and Gresham High School moving from six classes in 1966 to 59 this year.

Extension offerings of programs such as LEAP (Law Enforcement Education Program) or volunteer firemen training help meet special needs of specific groups. Approximately 43 law enforcement people in East Multnomah County took part in training leading to an AA degree this past year. In ZigZag, a special firefighting course was given for training of volunteer firemen.

Other special programs are offered as needs indicate.

Timberline Trailers in Sandy received assistance from MH-CC Extension Services whereby 13 mid-management personnel received training in supervision.

In another area, one of the most popular courses was upholstery. The course was held at Gateway Upholstery and was taught by the owner.

Some of the more unusual courses included Shoemaking, Hotline Training, Pioneer Crafts, Winetasting and God's Miracles Today.

These special courses are non-reimbursable (Mt. Hood receives no state money for conducting them), but the tuition makes them cost covering.

A vital component of Mt. Hood's extension program comes in Adult Basic Education and General Education Development programs. These services met the needs of some 436 individuals during the last year.

There are approximately 10,000 persons in the MHCC district with less than a high school education. Of these, more than 3,000 need Adult Basic Education training as they fall below the eighth grade level.

This year, 763 students who dropped out or were forced out of high school were completing their work during the evening through the Intermediate Education District in cooperation with MHCCD Extension Services.
