Equal Justice for All?

Last weekend in Upper Marlboro, Md., Arthur Bremer was handed a 63-year sentence for the attempted assassination of Gov. George Wallace.

The same weekend, a 20-year-old Portland youth was given one weekend in jail and a year's probation for killing a man.

The difference? Bremer used a gun, the Portland youth a car.

We know all about premeditation etc., but something clearly seems awry here. The Portland victim is just as dead as if he'd been stabbed, shot or garroted. Evidence was presented indicating the driver had

been travelling at 50-60 mph when the victim, an 18-year-old youth, was hit.

Yet because his weapon of destruction was a car, he gets something less than a slap on the wrist.

This is not to suggest that Bremer got five minutes more in jail than he deserved. Nor to suggest that a 63-year sentence might be requisite in a driving case.

It's merely to suggest that the courts soon must realize that a car is just as lethal a weapon as a gun, a knife or a club.

The tap-on-the wrist technique clearly isn't working.

Is the Weather Changing?

The plans for the shelter were designed by three seniors in architecture at the

University of Oregon-Kent Burrow, Jack Nickle, and Mike McDermott.

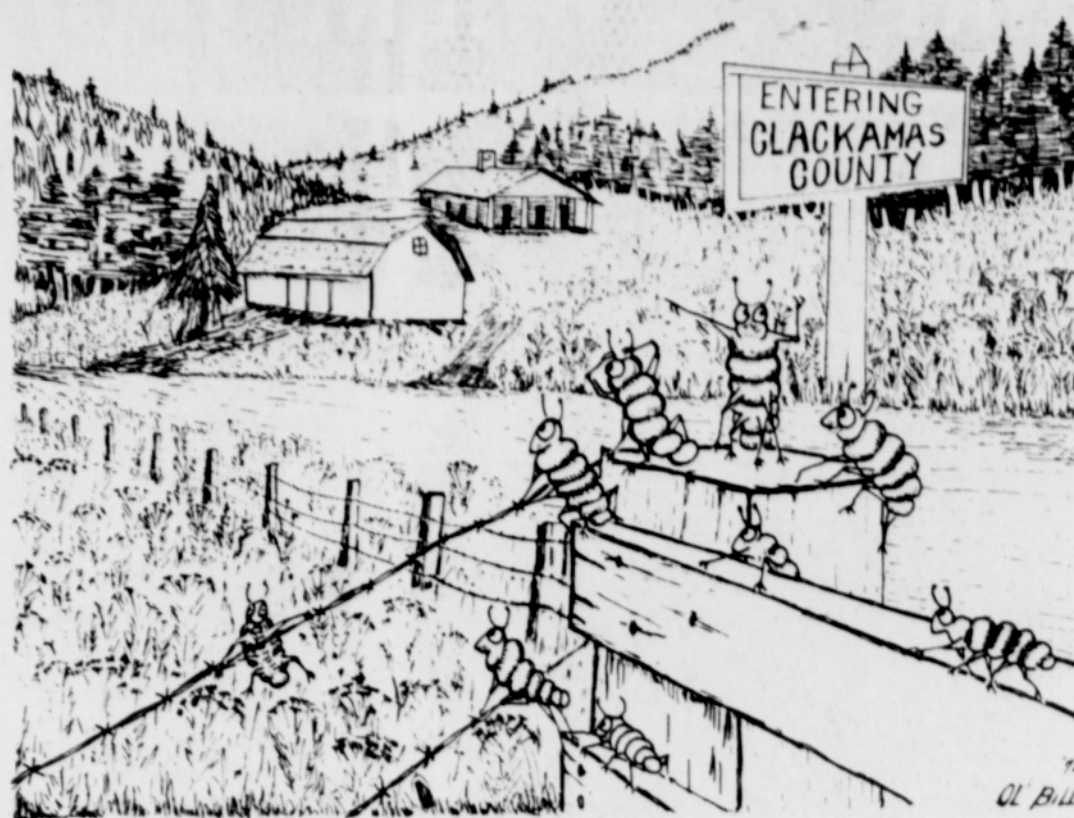
At the present the foundation has collected about one-fifth of the estimated \$21,000 cost for the building. They are seeking donations of labor and materials as well as money.

Power turn on date set by Reynolds Metal

Power for the first potline at Reynolds Metal Co., Troutdale, will be turned on Sept. 1, a spokesman for the company told The Outlook Wednesday.

Power on the second potline will be turned on Sept. 15. A few workers are now being called back to prepare the plant for opening. The plant has been closed since Nov. 30 of last year.

Reynolds said it plans to reactivate two 25,000 ton-per-year potlines at the Troutdale plant by October. This would bring the company's operating rate to 90 per cent of its annual U.S. primary Capacity of 975,000 tons.

The company, which had cut back production due to a supply-demand imbalance, said it is restarting Troutdale because of continuing increases in demand for the metal and a strike at its reduction plant in Baie Comeau, Quebec, Canada. The Canadian plant has been struck since June 23 because of an impasse in negotiations on a new labor contract.

The Troutdale plant has four

25,000 ton-per-year potlines, plus a new 30,000 ton line which has never been activated. The company said it is taking steps to be in a position to open additional lines at Troutdale

quickly if demand warrants it in the months immediately ahead.

When in full production the Troutdale plant employed approximately 900 persons.

Traffic slowed

Visitors will have an easier time finding their way on and off Mt. Hood Community College campus this fall.

A visitors control and security station, nearing a Sept. 1 completion date, is under construction at the north entrance to the campus just off Kane road.

"Visitors to the campus will now be able to find where they want to go," said Jim Kennedy, director of campus security. The station will be manned all day long and serve as a traffic directory center, Kennedy added.

In addition to serving as a directory post, the security station will be the only entrance to the campus during late night hours and during weekends.

All other gates on the campus will be closed during this time period. The tighter control will enable the security office a way to find out who is coming and going on the campus. "At the present time, we aren't sure who is on the campus at all times," stated Kennedy.

Visitors, on arrival to the college, will receive a token at the main gate and this token will let them into special visitor parking areas anywhere on campus.

The only exception to the closing hours for the campus might be when a special event is in progress. Then the gates will remain open so members of the community may find parking.

Toddler drowns in Sandy

The child missing in the Sandy River since Tuesday evening has been identified as 2-year-old Michael Morrow, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudy Morrow, 1002 SE 210th.

Sheriff's officers were diving for the youngster until 1 a.m. Wednesday and were continuing Wednesday morning. Rescue efforts were hindered by poor underwater visibility of one foot.

An unidentified toddler was swept from his father's arms in strong current on the Sandy River Tuesday evening.

Divers from the Multnomah County Sheriff's office continued their search for the youngster Wednesday morning.

Riverside observers said the youngster was being carried through the water just upstream from the Troutdale bridge when the two were caught in deep water and strong current. The father was unable to keep hold of the child.

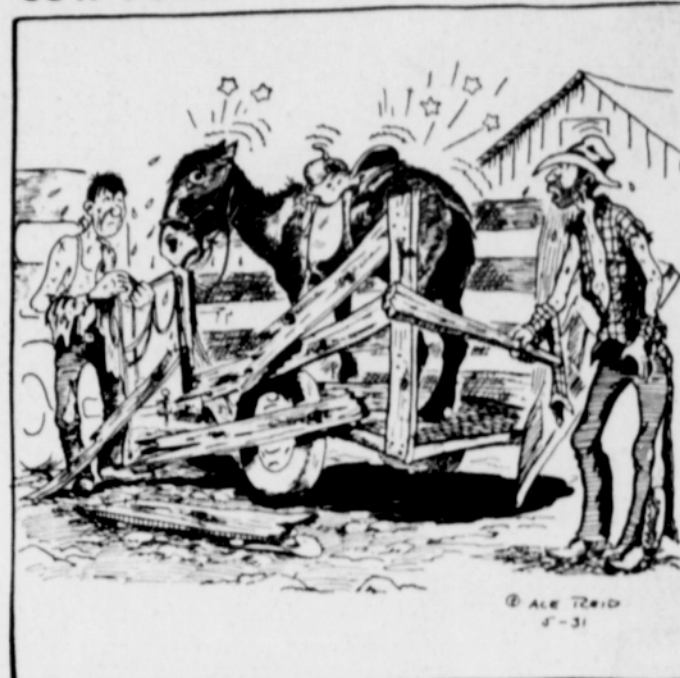
