Council Candidates Needed

It could be a year of candidates for the Sandy city council, but only if interest increases.

This fall four council positions, including the mayor's seat, are up for election. Each of the three council seats are four year terms and the mayor's position is a two year term.

As of Wednesday afternoon, only three petitions have been taken out by candidates.

Each candidate must get 20 registered voters inside the city limits to sign their petition to have his or her name placed on the Nov. 7 ballot.

Granted anyone thinking of running for a council position must be prepared to spend many, many hours dealing with the problems of a growing city. And for no pay.

We urge qualified candidates to get their names on the ballot so the people of Sandy will continue to have good leadership.

The next few years are very important to the future of Sandy as it begins to feel the growth from the Gresham area and it hires its first city administrator starting Jan. 1, 1972.

The Tourist Industry Fights Back

A lot of Oregonians, from Gov. McCall on down, have questioned the value to Oregon of continuing growth in the tourist industry.

There have been abundant hints that the welcome mat has been pulled in, as far as Oregonians are concerned. What we've got is ours and we don't want to share it.

But the tourist industry is Oregon's third largest and predictably, it's beginning to counter-attack.

A group in Newport has challenged the governor head-on and has labeled his position on tourism as "political baloney."

The Newport group is doing everything it can to promote tourism; everything from advertising to

handing out cards to visitors telling them they're welcome.

The group's chairman says "We want to show tourists we're not a bunch of Archie Bunkers."

The tourist industry, obviously, has far too much invested to sit back idly while business dries up. It's only natural that some sort of counter-attack against the tourist-stay-home theme should be mounted.

The danger, of course, is that Gov. McCall's statements should be so misinterpreted so that tourists really do stay away in droves. No one, least of all the governor, is insensitive to the damage this would do to the state's economy.

Some clarification seems in order.

The 18-24 Year-Old Vote

The one big imponderable of the 1972 elections is just where will the 18-24 vote land.

Most people assume that the 18-24 year-olds will vote about like their parents, roughly an even split between Republicans and Democrats.

There are polls to back up this forecast. Yet there are other equally-reliable polls that show just the opposite.

A poll taken by a Chicago newspaper at the University of Michigan recently showed deep dissatisfaction on the part of students. They rejected, the poll said, much of the things for which their parents

stood and were ready this fall to vote that protest.

On the presidential level, most soothsayers are predicting a Nixon victory. Yet if candidate McGovern could capture the 18-24 vote by a landslide margin, he would make the election extremely close. In fact, some Democrat strategists are convinced that McGovern can win with the youth vote piled on top of the normal Democratic turnout.

All of which explains why both parties are wooing the new voters so diligently. They could be the key in November.

Head Start elects

The Sandy Community Action Council recently selected Tom Klein, head of the Head Start Program in Sandy, as its new president.

He will take over for President Brother Andrew. Other officers chosen included W. Pete Sulzbach, vice-president; Joyce Marcy, secretary; Ned Dyal, treasurer, and Jim Ayers, representative to Development Opportunity, Inc.

The Sandy Community Action Council has a service center on Main and Shelley Streets in Sandy. HELP volunteers are on duty from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The phone number is 668-4746.

The center is presently in need of funding and food.

"We are really short on food," said Mrs. Astri Torbergson, coordinator for the HELP program.

The center offers many emergency services such as transportation to the hospital, food, clothing, housing, auto

repairs, and will help to find jobs for those who need one.

There are approximately ten women who presently work as volunteers at the center. They work for a half day shift once a week.

In other business at the Community Action Council meeting, Jim Ayers reported receiving a check for \$1867 from a federal grant given to the council after his preparation of a proposal for training leaders of the Sandy community concerning drug abuse.

There will be a two week special school concerning drugs operated by the federal government in San Francisco this January. It will be attended by Jim Ayers, Police Chief Fred Punzel, Councilman Jim Duff, student Connie Eldridge, and student Tom O'Hare. The \$1867 will be drawn upon for expenses.

To the Editor:

Very shortly, this community will have the opportunity to take part in starting a Community School.

The basis of this program is that the school facilities in a community belongs to the people of the community, and that if there is a need to use the facilities more than eight hours a day—nine months of the year, then those facilities should be used by the people who have paid for them. There are many more people of all ages, in this community who have a need to use educational and recreational facilities, than the six to 18 year-olds. If any person in the community has any interest, whether professional, educational, recreational, or social, he should be able to use a facility that he paid to pursue that interest.

Therefore, a group of

volunteers from Sandy, Cottrell, and Bull Run, have put together a survey that is intended to identify the needs of the people of these communities. If the response is large enough, we will be able to put together a good program to offer the people this fall. Selection of "interests" to be offered will be based on the returns of the survey, and the availability of class leaders.

The communities already have the full cooperation of the school boards involved. All that is needed now is the help of local groups and individuals in publicizing the Community School. We need to reach as many people as possible, in order to have a meaningful program. We also need feedback from any and all sources.

New Outlook building under way

Construction is scheduled to get under way later this week on a new building for the Gresham Outlook.

The new building, which will be almost two and one-half times as big as current quarters, will be located at 1200 N.E. Division, just west of Burnside.

It will be located on a two-acre tract.

Designer of the building is J. Ben Penners of The Dalles, a specialist in the field of newspaper design. He has planned and supervised construction of a number of daily newspapers but this is his first

venture into the weekly field. Paul B. Emerick Co. of Gresham will be the contractors and Gary Peterson of Portland the consulting engineer.

Concurrent with the new building, a new six-unit Goss Community newspaper press has been purchased. It will replace the four-unit press which The Outlook has used since 1962.

The new press will give The Outlook and its printing affiliate, Eastmont Press, not only more capacity but also more versatility in the use of color.

It is hoped that the new building will be completed by Christmas.

The Outlook has been located at 226 N. Main for over half a

century but finally completely outgrew existing space.

Outlook Publisher Lee Irwin said that "More than anything,

we think the new building underscores the depth of our belief in the future of the Gresham-Sandy area."

Two men who were formerly active in the operation were sleeping in the building at the time of the fire. One man said he was awakened by the blaze and aroused his companion. They escaped.

Arson suspected in fire

Bob Eisele, Gresham fire marshal, said Wednesday morning that he has not ruled out possible arson in the Flea Market fire.

He has learned that about two weeks ago a can of gasoline was discovered at the Flea Mart, obviously placed in position to start a

fire. Eisele and Detective Joe Wooley are working with a county arson man to pursue several suspects.

Eisele said he had estimated the loss to the Flea Mart merchants at about \$8,000. Few had insurance.
