County fair said
record breaker

The 1972 Clackamas County Fair was a record-breaker, both financially and attendance-wise, final tabulations just completed at the Canby fairgrounds office disclose. All previous records fell by the wayside as the 66th annual event came to a close the night of Aug. 19, reports fair manager Cheryl Cannon.

Student's
body
found

The body of an 18-year-old student at the Residential Manpower Center in Springdale was found Tuesday afternoon on a bank of the Sandy River, according to sheriff's reports.

The victim, John Michael Huff II, lived in Hillsboro before coming to the center. He was found at the foot of a 35 foot cliff, his face and upper chest lying in shallow water, according to deputies.

The River Patrol was dispatched to pick up the body, which could not be reached on foot.

The Multnomah County medical investigator's office was investigating the cause of death Wednesday morning.

Persons who were floating down the river found the body when they wandered ashore, deputies said.

Total attendance, based on the formula used by the State Fair and other county fairs, was 42,675, an increase of approximately a thousand over the then all-time record established in 1970. Attendance at this year's event was up some 6500 above last year's figure.

A total of 25,605 paid admissions netted gate receipts of \$33,880.00. Last year's gate receipts totalled \$28,150.00.

This year, for the first time, a parking fee of 25 cents per car was charged. Gross receipts from this source were \$2647.00. In addition, some \$5,000 was realized as the fair's share of the carnival operation and over \$4,000 was taken in on booth rentals and concession percentages.

President of the Clackamas County Fair Board is Robert J. Elkins of Molalla. Other directors are Robert Beatie, Mrs. James Garvison, James P. Henderson, and John Rosebrook.
