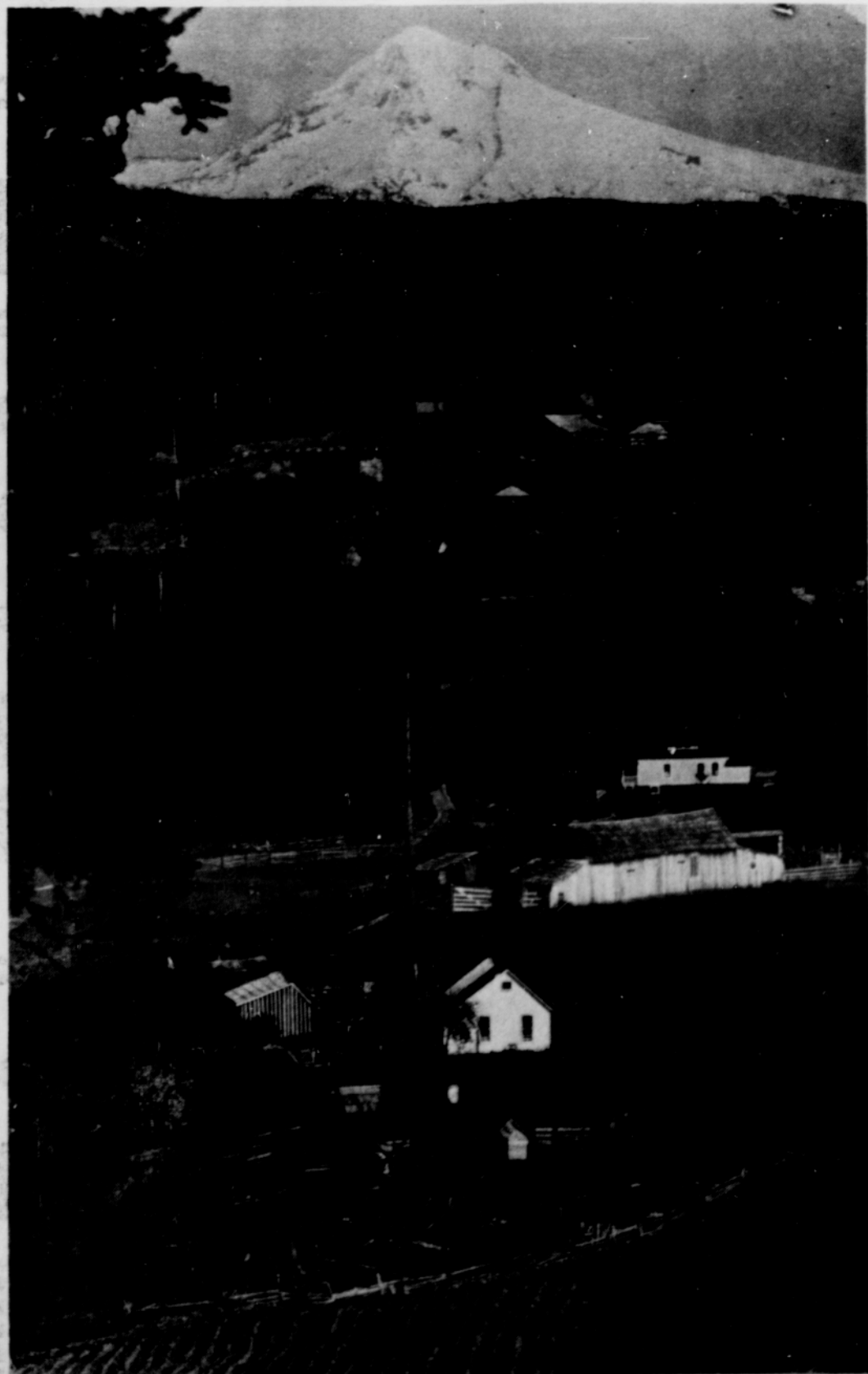
Accompanying the family style dinner will be a bazaar with booths of homemade candy, white elephants, arts and crafts, African violets, fish pond, and pot holders.

Concern for beauty expressed by council

Concern for esthetics was expressed by Gresham city council members Tuesday night.

First there was a report from the Planning Commission. Dick Close and Chet McRobert, commission members, suggested to the council that a landscaping standard be set for all business and industrial areas.

They asked for an ordinance to require that at least 15 per cent of the building site be landscaped, that it be designed professionally and only organic materials be used. They don't like plastic flowers or astroturf lawns.

As a comparison it was pointed out that the landscaped area of Gresham's off-street parking lots is about 24 per cent.

The council did not accept the ordinance concept as a way of enforcing such regulations. It was suggested that the Design Review Board could control these amenities.

The Design Review Board was created Tuesday night at the third and final reading of ordinance 605.

This calls for a board of seven persons; five to be professionals, architects, engineers, etc., and two to be lay people.

The purpose of the ordinance is to help assure that building designs be in good taste and in harmony with the surrounding area.

There was some opposition to the ordinance expressed because it was felt that there was some duplications with the functions of other departments such as planning and building departments.

Also there was some scepticism on who would be qualified to decide whether a building is in good taste.

The Design Review Board will meet on the first and third Mondays of each month. Members are expected to be named within a few days.

Kindergarten sets orientation day

The Welches Kindergarten will have a "Get Acquainted Day" on Friday, Sept. 8, at the school.

All children entering kindergarten this year at Welches are invited. Those who were registered by Sept. 1 have been mailed an invitation notifying them what time to come.

There will be several different sessions

held during the morning in the kindergarten room 25. This is held so that students may get acquainted in smaller groups before adjusting to a full classroom situation.

The school recommends that a parent or guardian accompany the child.

DHIA announces monthly report

Clackamas DHIA testers reported 16 official test herds and seven unofficial test herds were recorded during July.

The 80-cow herd of Holsteins and registered Brown Swiss owned by Paul Weber, West Linn, led the list with a daily milk per cow production of just over 46 pounds and 1.8 pounds milk fat per cow. Eleven other herds were recorded with official production of 40 or more pounds of milkfat per month:

Max Sherman and Harold Otta, Canby; Otto Straub, Hubbard; Rognar Anderson, Colton; Mrs. Wallace Aschoff, Arnold Moore and Meier Dairy Farms, Boring; Rudy Luscher, West Linn; Donald Moison, Oregon City; Gerhardt Lewis, Mulino; and James Madsen,

Woodburn. Top producing cow since June in milkfat was a four-year-old Holstein of Arnold Moore & Son, recording 837 pounds in 305 days.

Top producer in milk was a three-year-old registered Holstein owned by Otto Straub, recording 23,840 lbs. milk, also for 305 days and milked twice daily.

The American Guernsey Cattle Club, Peterborough, N.H., reports a junior three-year-old registered Guernsey cow owned by Staehely Bros., Oregon City, has completed an official DHIA record of 13,320 pounds milk with 650 pounds fat under the supervision of the Cattle Club, Clackamas DHIA and Oregon State University.
