

Voter registration grows

Clackamas County Clerk George Poppen reports a growing interest in voters registration since the first of September, with many new registrations being received daily.

Although the general election will be on Nov. 7, the last time a county resident may register to vote at that election is Saturday, Oct. 7th at 8 p.m.

To be eligible to vote, an elector must be a citizen of the United States and at least 18 years of age and have been a resident of the state of Oregon for at least 30 days.





Poppen states that in addition to his elections office at the county courthouse, he has appointed more than 500 registrars throughout the county to assist in voter

registration. Inquiries as to where to register should be directed to the elections department of the County Clerk's office.

Elector who have moved their place of residence or have changed their names must re-register to be eligible to vote. He urges anyone not certain as to his voting status to phone the elections office at 665-3311, extension 331.
