Sandy residents were among those who attended two hearings concerning the proposed rate increase by the General Telephone Company. The hearings were held Wednesday, Oct. 5, at the Beaverton City Hall, at 10 a.m. and 7 a.m.

testified at the morning hearing against the proposed rate increase. At the evening hearing, Mrs. Seeger testified against the inefficient service.

## Gaddis seeks early clearance

GOP sheriff candidate Carl Gaddis has indicated he has offered complete cooperation with the state attorney general's office to clear charges against his campaign.

The attorney general's office is said to be conducting an investigation into the campaign of Gaddis for possible violation of the state election laws.

Gaddis states he was unaware his campaign was being investigated until last

week when the Attorney General Lee Johnson made public that his office was investigating both the Gaddis campaign and that of Craig Berkman, Portland, GOP candidate for state treasurer.

Gaddis has asked that the investigation be completed as soon as possible and that indictment be made or exoneration given. The candidate said he was willing to cooperate with the investigation and has opened his records to Johnson's investigators.
