Good News On Proctor

There was good news at the city council meeting Tuesday night concerning improvement work on Proctor Ave.

The good news was that both the State Highway Department and the city have the necessary funding to get the first stage done next Spring.

The council and the city engineers will be meeting with property owners along the street next month to finalize plans for the total project.

Both the city engineer and the state highway representative at the meeting, indicated they saw no problem in getting the highway

section of the project completed by June 30, 1973.

The project will probably cause some problems with local traffic during the construction period, but when the project is completed there will be a better traffic flow through the center of town.

The work on Proctor again shows the need for a business core committee to coordinate improvements in the business center of Sandy.

Maybe the meetings between the city officials and property owners along Proctor Ave. can act as a base from which a business core committee could be formed.

tegrity of the building after her daughter had complained to her about stairways and floors leading to two new classrooms in the building.

In a preliminary report to the planning director by county Building Inspector George A. Stubbins in response to Mrs. Coleman's letter, it was noted that there were several discrepancies. The inspector reported that he felt that the roof trusses over the windows in the new classrooms were inadequately supported and suggested that "under these circumstances (total) it is my opinion that classes should not be held in the new classrooms."

Mrs. Coleman hired R.B. Resseger, an Oregon City engineer, in late September to

make an inspection of the school addition. In his inspection report, Resseger said that his "observations have lead me to the opinion that some serious structural deficiencies do exist." He recommended that an engineering firm be retained to complete a more detailed investigation of the total building structure.

The school, built by the Leajeld Construction Co., of Portland, was opened for school in 1969. Currently 293 students are enrolled.

The district budgets each year funds for snow removal and principal Earl Covey said the snow removal funds are available this year. He also noted no snow problems had occurred during the past three winters.

Once the board gets the report of the engineering firm whatever action is needed will be taken, said Covey.

The Fire Department went on record as supporting the move by the Sandy city council to endorse the Clackamas County street numbering program.

"We urge everyone to support the council on this measure by contacting the County Commissioners, preferably by a short letter or post card, telling them of our need to have this done as soon as possible," said Rathke.

Fire permits for backyard burning of tree clipping, etc., may be obtained at the fire hall, at anytime of the day. Permits are being issued for the period of Oct. 27 thru Nov. 30. This will be the only residential burning allowed by the DEQ, until next Spring.
