Cookware fraud outlined

The old cookware sales pitch has a new twist. Don't be lured into being a dealer for the company for the promise that you can earn thousands of dollars by selling pots and pans.

Indoor gardening tips outlined

Don't drown house plants and expect them to like it. They must have air in the soil around the root systems to do their best, advises Wilbur W. Burkhart, Oregon State University area extension agent.

If you have a new house plant, or one that is not doing well, make a daily inspection of soil at the top of the container. Dig down gently to determine the moisture content. If the soil is damp to the touch it indicates the right amount of moisture for most plants.

After a week of checking the plant, make a watering schedule to insure the right amount of moisture necessary to keep the plant healthy.

Containers with drains are more satisfactory than those with no way for excess moisture to escape, Burkhart says. This is especially important for beginners, who usually overwater houseplants.

When the extra water cannot escape into a saucer or shallow pan placed under the container, roots are likely to rot.

Well-drained pots also prevent the accumulation of salts, or the residues of plant foods applied to the soil. A plant suffering from salt toxicity will begin to show blackened or burned leaf tips and margins. Older house plants need repotting now and then to give roots more room, says the OSU agent.

If you suspect the plant is outgrowing its container, remove it by turning the entire plant upside down and tapping the top of the container on a bench or table.

If the roots are tightly matted in a tough, tight ball, a larger container and additional soil are needed.

Before replanting, squeeze and pull the root ball to break the mat and encourage the roots to grow out into the new soil.

Burkhart summarizes his tips on keeping house plants healthy: Don't overwater, provide adequate drainage, and repot when necessary.

offered a deal like this? First of all—don't buy. Second, notify the Oregon Attorney General, Salem, so that he can take action against this kind of fraud.

Marilyn Lunner, Oregon State University Extension Agent, explains the operation: To become a dealer, you have to buy the cookware yourself and bring in three other customers who buy, too. The cookware costs \$400, but that doesn't seem like much compared to the money you can make.

But just to break even you have to find seven people besides yourself who are willing to pay \$400 for cookware. The company's salesmen make this sound easy, but it isn't.

If each person involved must find seven other customers, it's easy to see the supply of people interested would soon be exhausted.

This kind of selling, called referral selling, is illegal in Oregon, but there are still gimmicks like this in operation, says Mrs. Lunner.

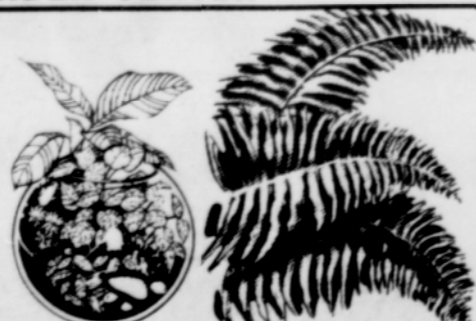
