A truck-trailer rig left the roadway on Burnside near NE First at about 2 a.m. and wiped out two General Telephone Co. poles.

Service was cut on the 663 and 668 prefixes as well as long distance trunks to Portland. Tom Kent, Gresham manager for General Telephone, said repair crews were called and were on the job by 3:30 a.m. Part of the service was restored by mid-afternoon Saturday and the balance by 7 in the evening.

Less Than Half Beef
A 1,000-pound live steer yields only about 432 pounds of saleable beef at the meat counter. The remaining 568 pounds consists of about 385 pounds of offal, which is removed by the packer in dressing out the 615 pound carcass, and another 183 pounds of undesired fat and bone trimmed from the carcass before it reaches the meat counter in the form of retail-ready cuts.

4-H gun safety popular

Over 175 young people in Clackamas, Washington and Multnomah counties currently are enrolled in the many faceted 4-H Gun Safety project, reports T. D. Zurcher, Clackamas County 4-H Agent.

The project is for boys and girls 11 to 19 years of age. Club members are provided an opportunity to develop safe habits with firearms, improve shooting skill and learn about wildlife conservation. As the 4-H member increases his skill, he moves through the five steps of the 4-H Gun Safety Advancement Program. Each step from 4-H Safe Shooter through 4-H Hunter presents exciting new challenges, adds Zurcher.

All participants must complete the Oregon Hunter Safety Training program before proceeding to the next step. In addition to shooting either 22's or BB guns the members learn how to properly dress and take care of game animals, how to cook food outdoors as well as

learning about Oregon's wildlife resources. Individuals interested in leading a Gun Safety club or becoming a member may contact their county 4-H office or their 4-H Community Coordinator for more information.

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State plans hearings on scenic waterway

Hearings will soon be held on the proposal to place 12½ miles of the Sandy River under the protection of the Scenic Waterways Act.

The Oregon Highway Commission will hold the hearings sometime in January, according to officials of the parks section of the State Highway Department.

The section of the river to be considered includes both Clackamas and Multnomah Counties.

For the past several months, according to state officials, an investigation has been made into the proposal and a report is being compiled on the section of the Sandy River between Dodge Park and Dabney Park.

The report is not yet completed, but when completed it will be made available to the public. The report covers suitability of the river to the Scenic Waterways Act and the effects of such a designation on land ownership and existing uses along the river section.

Over a year ago, the proposal was made to place this section of the Sandy River under the act. At that time, a public hearing was held in Sandy to discuss the proposal.

One of the questions raised at that meeting concerned the land ownership in the 12½ mile stretch of river.

No definite date for the meetings in January has been set.

Saints streak snapped

The bubble broke for Mt. Hood cagers Saturday, but hopefully not for long.

The Saints saw their win streak go down the drain when Oregon States jayvees put

together a 102-96 victory in Corvallis, giving Mt. Hood a 7-1 mark for the early season.

The Saints have two road trips this week to try and turn the tide. They meet Judson Baptist Thursday at 7:30 p.m. Friday at 5:45 p.m. the Saints meet the University of Portland jayvees.

The snow cancelled home contest with Clark scheduled for last Friday will be made up Dec. 30 at 8 p.m.

Saint mentor Herb Booth said after the contest with the Beavers: "We didn't play as well as we could."

"We were outrebounded in the first half. We only had two days of practice last week and it snowed."

Booth said the contest was a tremendous spectator game and the shooting figures showed it.

The Saints hit 45 of 92 from the floor to 39 for 79 for Oregon State. But the telling statistic was at the free throw line. The Beavers hit 24 of 33 shots from the gift stripe to only 4 for 6 for Mt. Hood.

High scorers for the Saints were Tony Hopson with 36, hitting on 18 of 37 attempts. Perry Campbell was close behind with 34, hitting a red hot 16 of 27 tries. Campbell also grabbed 12 rebounds.

"Without a doubt Campbell was the outstanding man on the floor," Booth said.

The 6-5 Alabama product fouled out with a minute remaining in the contest and got one of the biggest ovations of the night.

Mt. Hood big man Richard Smith got into foul trouble early and so missed a lot of playing time. He scored 12 points.

"We forgot what the word defense was," Booth explained. "They played an excellent ball game. I think we played at about 75 per cent of our potential."

"I think we learned some things from it."

The Saints trailed at halftime 51-48 and battled point for point with OSU in the second stanza. With 1:18 remaining Mt. Hood had a 2 point lead.

But then the foul bug took its toll and gave the win to the Beavers. The last 6 Oregon State points were from the foul line.

A couple of former Sandy High School cagers will be in the Judson Baptist ranks for the Saint contest—Ray Perkins, a 6-5 forward, and Bob Bueller, a 6-0 guard.

"One thing you can say about them is they always play tough against us," Booth said.

The University of Portland junior varsity squad will be another handful for the Saints. The front line for the Pilots runs 6-11, 6-6 and 6-5, so Booth feels his squad will have to use their quickness to come out on top.

A couple of varsity players are also expected to play in the contest for the U of P.

To date the Saints have averaged 87 points per ballgame to 68 for their opponents. Mt. Hood is hitting at a .435 clip from the floor.
