

Ullman appoints new assistant

Salem farmer and businessman Gayle Gilmour, 39, has been appointed district administrative assistant to Second District Congressman Al Ullman, it was announced today.

A graduate of Oregon State University, Gilmour will undertake legislative and liaison work in the 70,000-square-mile Second Congressional District which includes all of Eastern Oregon.

Currently a director of the Northwest Horticultural Congress, Gilmour is a past president of the Marion County Farm Bureau and served as chairman of the Marion County Democratic Central Committee for two years. He is also a member of the Salem City Club, Lions International, and the Marion County Juvenile Advisory Committee.

Gilmour said he would be working out of Ullman's district office in the federal building in Salem. He, his wife Leona, and their three children, Brett, Holly and Kerry, live at 1628 Sky Terrace S.E., Salem.

What's Cooking?

PORK CHOPS WITH GINGER ALE

4 center cut pork chops, 1 in. thick
1 can ginger ale
2 Tablespoons brown sugar
1 Tablespoon brown sugar
Salt and pepper pork chops and brown in a greased pan on both sides. Dissolve brown sugar in ginger ale; pour over chops and cover. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes to 1 hour or until ginger ale is absorbed. Serves 4.—From the files of Mrs. Louise Goddard, Knoxville, Tennessee.

RANCH STYLE SHORT RIBS

1 lb. beef short ribs
1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
Dash cayenne pepper
1/2 cup burgundy wine
2 Tablespoons chopped onions
2 Tablespoons wine vinegar
1 Tablespoon prepared mustard

Place meat on foil big enough to cover ribs completely. Combine all other ingredients. Cup up sides of foil; pour sauce over meat. Fold foil across top to make a packet; seal ends. Place packet in shallow baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Open foil, bake 1/2 hour longer.—From the files of Mrs. Howard W. Gerger, Sandy, Oregon. The following recipe was sent to me recently by Mrs. Hazel Lamb who got it from a relative in Iowa last summer.

GOOSEBERRY SALAD

Drain No. 2 can gooseberries. Put juice aside. Drain 1 can mandarin oranges, use juice in jello. Dissolve 3 oz. pkg. orange or lemon jello in 1 1/4 cups boiling liquid. Add 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1 cup colored miniature marshmallows. Stir until marshmallows are nearly melted. Cool, stirring occasionally. Place gooseberries in an 8" x 8" dish. Add mandarin oranges, 1/2 cup finely chopped celery, and 1 cup colored miniature marshmallows. Add juice drained from berries to cool jello. Pour over fruit. (May add 1/2 cup nuts if desired, but I prefer this salad without them.)

Serve with the following original salad dressing to bring out the flavor of this salad.

HAZEL'S SALAD DRESSING
1/2 cup IMO
1/2 cup Best Foods Mayonnaise
1/2 to 1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard

Salt to taste
1 teaspoon packaged French Dressing Mix (Good Seasons)

REFRIGERATOR CAKE

1 lb marshmallows
1/2 cup milk
1 No. 2 (20 oz.) crushed pineapple (drained)
1 pint whipped cream
24 graham crackers
Heat milk and marshmallows, stirring until marshmallows melt. Add juice from pineapple, fold in. Cool slightly. Add pineapple. Chill until it begins to thicken. Fold in whipped cream.

Crush 12 crackers. Put in bottom of large pan (paper lined). Put in mixture. Cover with remaining 12 crushed crackers. Chill several hours. Cut in squares and serve with coffee or tea.—From the files of Mrs. Jeanne Wilcox, Portland, Oregon. (Joanne Seeger's mother).

POOR MAN'S PECAN PIE

1 cup dark Karo syrup
1 cup rolled oats
1 cup sugar
2 eggs, well beaten
1 cube margarine, melted

"Swing into '73" will be the theme of the Sandy Christian Women's Club Luncheon, Friday, January 19 at the Adventist Center at noon.

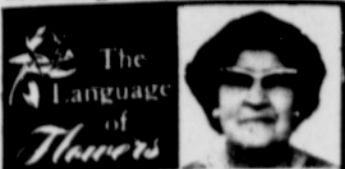
