

Hoodland artist opens her 'special place'

A long time dream has come true for Hoodland artist Veda Yancey, who has always wanted a studio of her own. "A special place, with ample storage for supplies, where one can leave a mess out and while away the hours in cheerful, cozy surroundings", is the desire of most artists and this is exactly what Veda Yancey has attained. Her new studio next door to the Yancey home at Mt. Air Park, off Highway 26, has everything she wants. Peaceful setting amid tall trees, high ceiling with plenty of windows, a fireplace and plenty of work space. Long sought after to share her talents with others, Veda's refusal to teach art classes in the past were based on the desire to "do it in my own place, in my own way". Now she is all set to do this and will open the studio Feb. 1, with daily classes from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Classes at the "Palette Pad" will include lessons in Folk Arts such as Tole painting, Rosemaling, Decoupage, Glazing and antiquing as well as oil painting. Veda and her husband

Garnett Yancey have lived in Hoodland for 11 years and have both been active in community affairs. Veda's talents were put to use frequently by the Hoodland Women's Club and the Mt. Players for posters and stage sets. Although Veda planned to "retire" when she moved here, she was soon involved in the operation of the Shake-Inn which her husband bought and later sold.

When the Shake-Inn was sold, she again "retired" to painting and was encouraged to exhibit some of her work. She took first, second and third place awards at the Washington State Art Exhibit in 1969.

Their mountain-style home is a showcase of charming mementos, beautiful refinished and antiques, with lovely examples of their fine talent for every phase of handicraft and artwork appearing in each nook and cranny. Hudson House, the problem-plagued Portland wholesale grocery firm, is attempting to sell its remaining physical assets, including a packing plant at Cottrell.

Related firms involved in the continuing liquidation include Hudson House, Inc., Hudson Stores, Patty Day and Continental Foods Inc.

A number of Gresham-area farmers are among the creditors of Hudson House. Most retail grocery operations, including the former Three Boys store in Gresham, have been sold.
