7,000 volunteer to march

An estimated 7,000 volunteers in Washington, Clackamas and Multnomah counties will be on the move Thursday, Jan. 25, in the traditional Mothers March for the March of Dimes.

Clackamas county chairman for the activity is Mrs. Douglas Esposito of Lake Grove.

The goal this year is \$60,000, or \$7,000 more than was raised in the Mothers March a year ago, according to Terry Baker, Portland attorney and former Oregon State University athletic great, who is general chairman of the tri-county campaign.

If a marcher does not find any person at home, a contribution envelope will be left under the door so donations can be mailed to the March of Dimes.

The volunteers will also give each person a coupon by which they can order a family medical record chart from the March of Dimes without charge.

Funds collected in the March of Dimes are used to fight birth

defects through research, treatment and public and professional education, Baker stated, pointing out that since 1965 the Tri-county chapter has allocated more than \$265,000 in support of the Birth Defects Metabolic Evaluation Center at the University of Oregon medical school.

In addition, the chairman reported, the national office of the March of Dimes has given

over \$72,000 to the Oregon medical school for various projects related to birth defects.

The local March of Dimes chapter also has allocated \$57,441 to the Devers Memorial Eye Clinic, Portland, since 1965.

Baker stated that over 250,000 babies are born each year in the United States with some kind of a birth defect.
