

Class tries new concept

A third grade class at Sandy Elementary School is one of 12 in the Northwest, which is trying out a new concept called "Contingency Management". Monday, when Mrs. Judy Warren's third graders come to school, they found that their room had been divided into two areas—one for work, and one for play. The work area contains the desks, and assignment materials. The play area is set up with tables for a variety of games and other activities.

The students were not surprised however. Mrs. Warren had prepared them for the unusual arrangement the week before. They knew that they would be given a series of short assignments during the day, and that if they met the requirements, they would have a short playtime after finishing each one. All were looking forward to trying out the new games in the play area. Positive reinforcement is the key to the new teaching method. Each student is given assignments which are geared to his ability level. He must

complete each one successfully and accurately within the time limit before he may go to the play area.

Under Contingency Management, the school day is broken up into alternating work and play activities. Equal time is given to both. Since the students work on individual tasks, slow students have the same opportunity to use the play area, as the brighter ones. The amount of work required varies according to ability.

Mrs. Judy Warren's class is one of four in the state of Oregon to participate in Con-

tingency Management. Mrs. Warren, along with Mrs. Lura Dell Callaghan, special Education counselor at Sandy Grade, attended the University of Oregon's Idea Diffusion Conference held Jan. 8-10 in Florence. They comprised one of 12 teams selected from the Northwest.

At the conference, one teacher from each grade was trained in the Contingency Management concept. These teachers will use the method in their classrooms for a trial period of ten weeks, then report back to another conference.
