

Silverton plays here Friday

Defense keys Sandy win over Estacada

The Sandy Pioneers will end the first half of the league basketball play Friday at home

when Silverton visits. The Pioneers must win this game and hope that Newberg upends

Molalla. This would give the Pioneers a share of the first half title.

The Pioneers with impressive wins over LaSalle and Estacada this week have a 7-2 league mark while the Molalla Indians are ahead of them with a 8-1 record.

"Newberg is one of the top ranked teams in the state and we lost to them by two points, while we lost to Molalla by one point," said Sandy coach Jim Kitchen, "the game between them should be a real good contest."

The Pioneers meanwhile, will have their hands full when Silverton comes to town. The Foxes are 3-6 in league play, but according to Kitchen are a team that is better than the record shows.

"They get tremendous shooting from the outside which will put a lot of pressure on our guards," said Kitchen.

Going into the game, the Pioneers are coming off their best game of the season in the 69-39 pounding of Estacada on Tuesday night. Last Friday, the Pioneers held up for a 65-58 win over LaSalle.

"This win over Estacada was by far our best game of the season," said Kitchen. "The players just went out and did the job to the Rangers."

The Pioneer defense was the key to the game as Estacada managed only six points in the first half, while the Pioneers sank 29 points and kept increasing the lead in both the third and fourth quarters.

Also, the defense shut off the Rangers' big guns Ed Read (10 points) and Jeff Kiggins (9 points) and had the Rangers commit 34 turnovers.

"While our defense shut them off, our offense was clicking," said Kitchen. The Pioneers for the game hit 58 per cent from

the field.

The big scorers for Sandy were Alan Nippert 24, and Dan Turin and Joe DeMarsh each with 16.

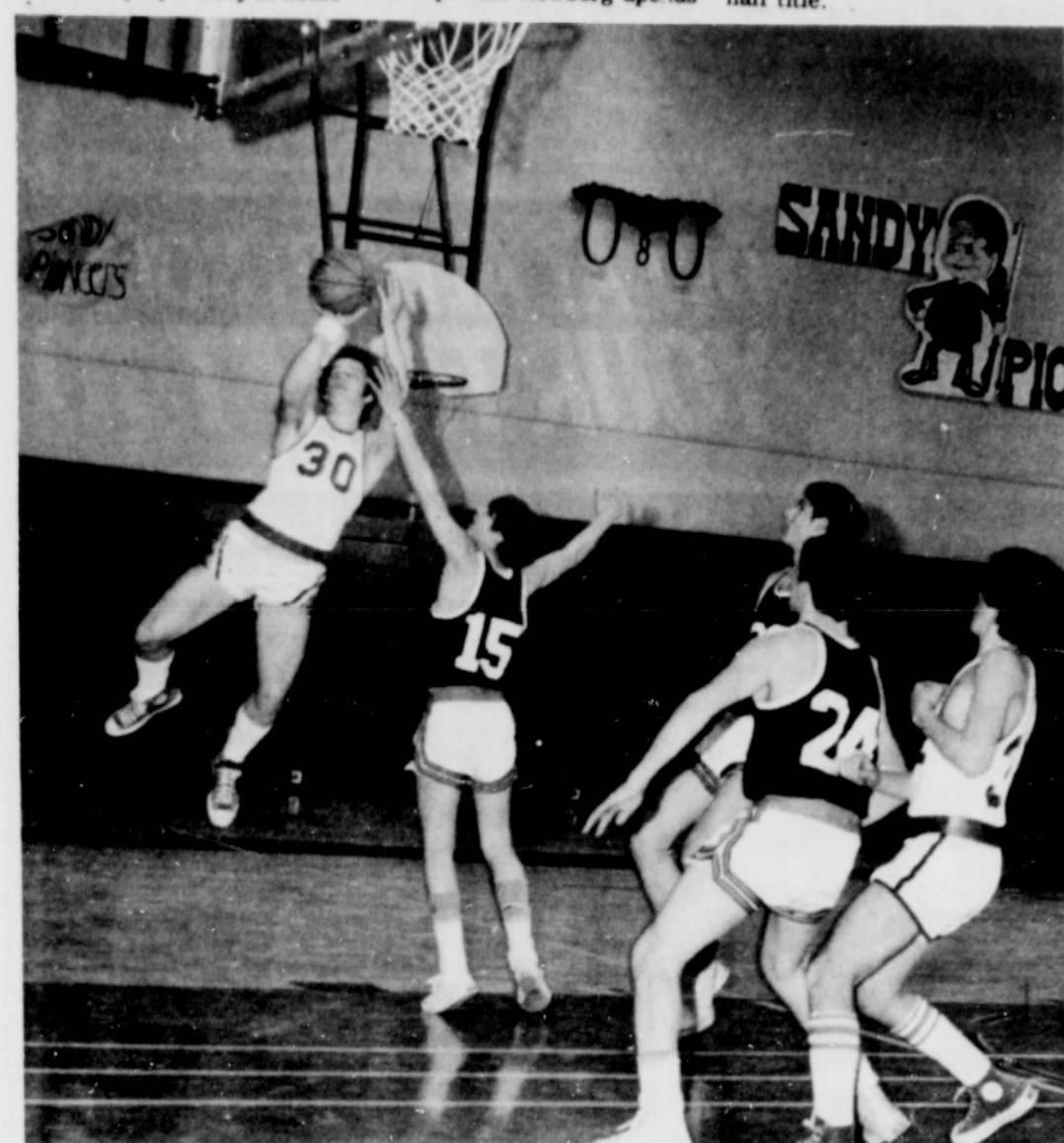
Nippert again had a tremendous offensive game as he hit on 10 of 13 shots in this game following a perfect 11 for 11 night against LaSalle.

"I was a little worried about the team being tight for the game," said Kitchen, "but the players were super cool and we jumped to an early lead."

Kitchen said this game proved to his players the advantages of playing tough defense and he looks for the Pioneers to continue to be tough defensively the rest of the season.

Frosh teams get three more wins

The frosh basketball teams at Sandy high school recorded three more wins and no losses during the past two weeks.

The Black team beat Canby and Estacada while the Red team beat Estacada.

The Blacks won 79-22 over Canby and 78-41 over Estacada. The Reds won 71-26 over Estacada as 12 men hit the

scoring column for Sandy.

In the wins over Estacada, top scorers for the Black team were Veley 21, Baylis 16, M. Peterson 13 and Anderson 11. Ron Lamm was top assist man with six.

For the Reds, the top scorers were Hunter 11 and Miller 10. Top rebounders were Perins nine and G. Peterson 11.

JV's split two games

The Sandy JV black team beat LaSalle for the first time ever in basketball after dropping a close tilt to Sweet Home last week.

The Pioneers upended LaSalle 57-47 playing "our best game of the season," according to Dennis Warren JV coach.

"This was our first game where we played as a team," said Warren. "We hit the boards, had good offensive movement and were able to handle their press."

The Pioneers out rebounded LaSalle 38-30 with John Miller hauling in 12 rebounds to lead the way for Sandy.

Top Sandy scorers were Jackson 2, Koepke 4, Covey 6, Miller 13, Hayes 8, Alps 2,

Kalama 2, Aubin 2 and Lundy 18.

In the loss to Sweet Home, Sandy blew a 24-23 halftime lead and a 40-38 lead at the end of three quarters.

Still in the loss, Warren saw some bright spots that will give the young Pioneers a chance to improve during the second half of the season coming up next month.

"Our offense is starting to move the ball and our shooting is improving," said Warren.

"Also, our zone defense has looked sharp in the last two games."

Top scorers for Sandy were Jackson 4, Koepke 6, Covey 6, Miller 16, Hayes 12 and Lundy 10.

Oregon State Game Commission News

Sport fishermen are reminded to return their expired salmon-steelhead licenses to the Game Commission as soon as possible. The law requires that these licenses be returned following the expiration date. Information obtained from them

is vital to the management of the state's more than 70 great salmon and steelhead producing rivers.

Collection boxes are located at all license dealers for the convenience of fishermen. The cards may also be returned directly to the Game Commission, 1634 SW Alder, Portland 97206.

Reino Koski, staff biologist who maintains the records, advises sport fishermen that the return of these cards cannot be overemphasized. The card should be returned whether the angler caught fish or not. The information provided is used to compute the statewide salmon and steelhead catch as well as the catch by individual stream.

This appears to be the year of the big steelhead. Reports from anglers indicate an unusually large number of lunker steelhead are being taken from coastal streams this winter.

We know of one 25-pounder caught from the Kikhis, one over 26 pounds from the Alsea, and one ironhead over 28 pounds from the Siuslaw. We have reports of many 15 to 20-pounders taken from most of the coastal steelhead streams.

There will be two more salmon and steelhead fish hatcheries in operation shortly which should boost production of smolts considerably. These are the Round Butte Hatchery on the Deschutes and the Cole Rivers Hatchery on the upper Rogue. Both hatcheries are being built and financed — Round Butte by Portland General Electric and Cole Rivers by the Corps of Engineers — to compensate the state for loss of upstream spawning areas as a result of dam construction.
