

Mother's help 'entry fee' at Damascus Preschool

BORING—Mothers are attending preschool classes out here.

That's part of the entry fee for enrolling their youngsters in the Damascus Preschool, conducted in the basement of United Methodist Church.

"It provides an opportunity to the mother to go to school with her child and assist with the daily program," said Mrs. Karen Akesson, chairman of the fund raising committee.

Fund raising is a project by which the school hopes to get out of the basement and establish itself in its own building on its own land. To that end the school will conduct a

bake sale at the Gresham Mall Shopping Center. Hours are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 3.

"Homemade pies, cakes, bread, cookies and candy will be on sale," she said.

"While most private schools have turned to federal grants, we are doing it ourselves," said Mrs. Akesson.

state subsidies or even just high tuition costs, this group of parents is determined that quality education and unique experiences can be achieved by grass roots participation.

High tuition does not describe the fees at this school. Costs to parents are \$10 monthly for three-year-olds, \$13.50 for 4-year-olds and \$20 for 5-year-olds in kindergarten.

"Tuition for the 51 students in the school pays for supplies and two professional teachers," she said.

"All teacher assistance, classroom cleaning, painting, carpentry, toy building, electrical or welding work are done by mother and father volunteers."

The school serves the Damascus-Boring area. Preschool teacher is Mrs. Patricia Cutsforth and kindergarten teacher is Mrs. Beverly Hirsch, both state certified and with BA degrees.

The school was started in a private home some two years ago by Rosemary Griffith and Janet Lader, Damascus mothers who felt that small children in widely separated households needed opportunity to play and learn with their peers.

Current president is Mrs. Nan Howard, Damascus; vice president, Darleen Alinger, secretary, Joyce Tracy; treasurer, Mary Elie McCamman, with Mrs. Lader and Mrs. Griffith completing the board of directors.

Board members feel they have worked out their own philosophy of experience for children of these ages.

"The 3-year-olds learn the basics of body movement, body parts and awareness," Mrs. Akesson said. "Four-year-olds become more involved in material things, and 5-year-olds in kindergarten stress the learning process. But, above all, it is fun for the children."

With the forthcoming Saturday bake sale, the mothers feel they have become old hands at fund raising. They have held a rummage sale and conducted a recipe party, to the point where they have established a land-purchase fund.

Who knows: If the cakes and cookies sell well they may go out on a land-shaping tour.

Poultry program in Boring

A 4-H poultry program dealing primarily with nutrition and the development of the chick embryo will be held at Boring Elementary School from 7 to 8 p.m. Feb. 3, according to John Mellott, Multnomah County extension agent in 4-H and youth development.

Members, leaders and friends in Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington and Columbia Counties are invited to this study of the basic nutritional requirements of poultry, Mellott noted.

There will be a session on the interpretation of feed bag labels as well as an opportunity to study the chick embryo in various stages of development.

Several microscopes will be available for use in the embryo study for even the most inquisitive eye, according to Mellott.

Clayton Wills, chairman of the Clackamas County Extension Service, will report the information on poultry nutrition and will help with the chick embryo phase of the program.

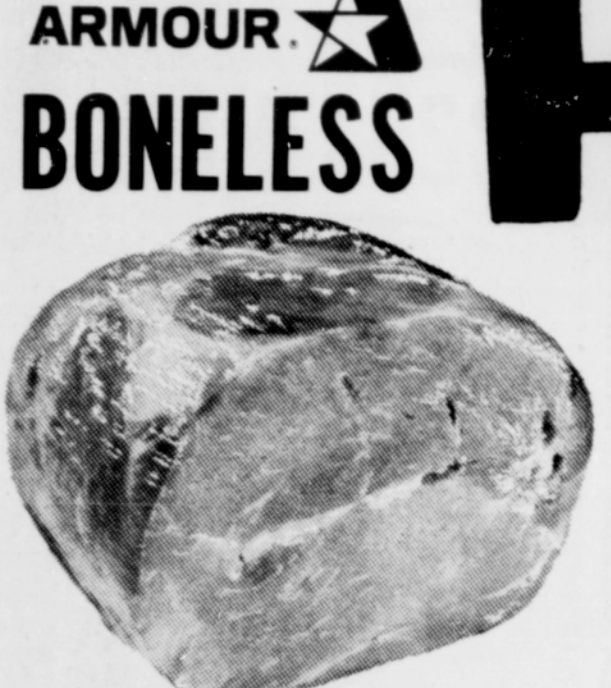

Louise Home director retires after 30 years

Mrs. Edwin (Kathryn) Carlson will retire Jan. 31 after 30 years of service at the Louise Home.

For the past 20 years, Mrs. Carlson has been superintendent of the Louise Home complex, operated by Albertina Kerr Homes, pioneer Oregon child care agency.

A nursing school graduate of the University of Oregon, Mrs. Carlson was sent to the Louise Home by the Red Cross in 1942 as an instructor in home nursing and mother and baby care. She joined the Louise Home staff as a nurse and instructor.



In 1962, the late Eida Russell, long-time executive director of Albertina Kerr Homes, named Mrs. Carlson to head the Louise Home operation.

The board of directors, staff and friends of Albertina Kerr Homes honored Mrs. Carlson at a reception recently in the new chapel, one of three buildings she has seen rise on the 23-acre campus. Only two of the original five buildings remain.

She reminded them that the barn, cows, pigs, and large farm that once were part of the complex at 722 NE 162 Ave. are all gone and the area completely urbanized.

Although she has dealt only with girls during her 30 years at the Louise Home, Mrs. Carlson participated in the planning which recently led the Albertina Kerr board to announce that it will consider programs which will bring boys to Louise Home.

Mrs. Carlson will join her husband, Edwin, a retired police sergeant, in many leisure time pursuits, including a probable trip to Sweden. Also, on the list, along with fishing and painting, are volunteer services to the Louise Home and the Red Cross.

Mrs. Carlson hears regularly from many of "her girls" and is planning to form a group of them to assist in her volunteer work plans.
