Horse and dog shows, plant, rummage, candy and baked food sales, plus archery shoots, pony rides, a tots barnyard and many, many more fun activities are being planned for the 1973 4-H Family Fun (d) Fair, May 19 at the Clackamas County Fairgrounds in Canby. The Clackamas County 4-H Leaders Association is sponsoring the event according to T.D. Zurcher, Extension Agent. All 4-H Clubs in Clackamas County are invited to participate by either initiating or contributing goods to one of

the sales. The Co-chairmen, Mrs. Linda Moon and Mrs. Carol Christopher of Boring, also invite all Extension Home Study Groups and others who may want to lend support.

All proceeds from the events will go toward the development of the State 4-H Education Center near Salem. The 720 acre Center is being purchased and developed through donations from interested individuals and groups. The Clackamas County Leaders Association has contributed over \$5,000 to the Center principally from the proceeds

from the Fun (d) Fair.

The Center will provide thousands of our young people with additional fun and educational experiences. Currently, cabins, horse trails, photography darkrooms, nature trails, archery and rifle ranges and many other projects are being worked on by various 4-H clubs and interested groups.

This summer the Northwest Forestry Camp will be held at the Education Center during the second week of July. Many Clackamas County 4-H'ers enrolled in the various outdoor

projects will be enjoying the opportunities of the center at this time. In addition several county 4-H clubs are planning one and two day excursions during the spring and summer months. With one of the largest 4-H enrollments in the state, Clackamas County's participation in the activities at the Center will continue to increase, adds Zurcher.
