They went in to Gresham by bus soon after four and skated from about 4:30 til 6:30, arriving back in Sandy to be picked up by their parents around seven o'clock.

There were the usual falls, bumps, and bruises, but no broken bones reported. The sixth grade will have their skating party tomorrow (Friday).

Blue book expanded this year

The 1973-74 edition of the "Oregon Blue Book," featuring an aerial view of the golden pioneer atop the Capitol, is off the presses and is ready for distribution and public sale, according to Secretary of State Clay Myers.

Twenty thousand copies of the Blue Book were printed, about half of which, under Oregon law, will be distributed free to schools, libraries and governmental agencies, while the remainder will be sold to the public at \$2 a copy.

Myers noted the Legislative Section of the Blue Book has been expanded in this edition to include House and Senate committees named at the beginning of the session last month.

The Agencies, Boards and Commissions Section has been completely reorganized to reflect the major governmental changes, such as creation of the Department of Human Resources, effected in the 1971 session, Myers said.

Myers said special effort was made to make this edition as current as possible. He noted that it includes, for example, a Marion County district judge who was sworn in only a week before publication.

Editor of the Blue Book was Assistant Secretary of State George Bell, who also edited the two previous editions. Assistant editor was Linda Koellmann. The Blue Book was printed by Daily Journal of Commerce, Portland.

Misleading Mail

Annoyed by mail that looks like a bill but is really just an asking you to send money? Help is coming. The U.S. Postal Service has ordered that all mail intended to solicit money but which could be mistaken for a bill carry these words on the envelope: "THIS IS NOT A BILL." On the mail itself, these words must appear in boldface capital letters: "THIS IS A SOLICITATION. YOU ARE UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO PAY UNLESS YOU ACCEPT THIS OFFER."

Year of Auto Legislation

People are starting to call this Oregon Legislative year the "year of the auto." These are just some of the consumer-related bills that have been introduced: licensing of auto salesmen and repairmen; prohibiting auto insurance companies from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, marital status or occupation; amending medical benefit and "fault, no-fault" provisions of Oregon's auto insurance law; abolishing deficiency judgments when consumer goods including motor vehicles are repossessed; changing driver's license requirements; and permitting highway money to be spent on mass transit.

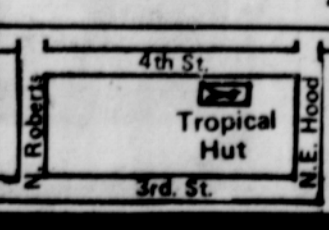
