Homeowners' tax relief doesn't come automatically

Homeowners' property tax relief is not automatic. Applications must be filed before the April 16 deadline. Residents of East County who want help may apply at the Gresham Senior Adult Center, 50 NE Elliott, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. daily. Relief is available in two ways. Homeowners may apply to the tax collectors for credit, which will decrease the amount of property tax they must pay; or they may pay the tax in full

and apply to the Department of Revenue for refunds. Questions will be answered on application procedures for credits or refunds at the meeting.

The legislation requires that property tax relief be made available to homeowners with the greatest needs. The amount of tax relief is graduated according to income with a maximum of \$400 for greatest relief. This year's property tax relief is available to all homeowners, including Senior Citizens, must apply this year. There are certain materials that are necessary for filing. They are:

- (1.) Applicant's Social Security Number.
 - (2.) Spouse's Social Security Number.
 - (3.) Proof of all sources of household income (including all members of household who help with expenses).
 - (4.) A complete copy of your property tax assessment.

New harvesting techniques will ease logging impact

An Oregon State University study shows that controlled cable felling of trees and use of buffer strips can help maintain stream quality and reduce logging impact on old growth forests.

The research was conducted over the past two years in the western Cascades on small headwater streams. It was directed by Dr. Henry Froehlich, forest engineer in OSU's School of Forestry.

Controlled felling of trees (pulling trees away from the stream by cable) increased stream debris two-fold, while conventional felling techniques caused an eight-fold increase, the study shows.

In the study, Froehlich also collected information on the background amounts of organic material—debris that is found naturally in streams located in undisturbed areas. He found 6 to 28 tons of debris per 100 feet of stream channel under natural conditions.

Buffer strips, rows of trees left alongside stream banks, provide a debris barrier for streams, and while the study shows penetration of some logging debris, it was less than

a one-fold increase. In some cases there was no increase. Froehlich pointed out that the State of Oregon Forest Practices Act requires clean up of streams of logging operations. The forest engineer believes that use of these two techniques would decrease and in some instances eliminate the added expense of clean-up.

Although controlled felling makes less impact on streams it is about three times more expensive than conventional felling, Froehlich found, because each three must be climbed, cables attached and power provided for pulling. The increased costs, however, may be offset by less timber damage—because it is felled

uphill—and because of savings in stream clean-up.

Buffer strips also were found to have limitations. They cause engineering problems in steep terrain and the trees are susceptible to blowdown.
