County budgets funds from revenue sharing

Clackamas County will hold a public hearing March 14 on a supplemental budget of \$707,010. The budget represents the county's share from the federal revenue sharing funds.

The building program will get the largest share of the budget \$300,000. This is for existing facilities and new construction this year, which includes the remodeling of the old IED offices into office space for the county assessor's office.

The second top priority in the budget is for materials and services for road maintenance. This amount is \$240,000.

New vehicles for several county offices and related equipment is budgeted for

\$137,000 and park acquisition and development will get \$30,000.

In addition, 10 departments or fund categories are specified for \$1 each. This allocation will permit later fund transfer if the county commissioners feel a shift in support is necessary.

Included in the \$1 group are equipment for nine different county offices, county fair board and architect and engineer fees.

The county offices mentioned in the capital outlay budget are clerk, auditor, library, surveyor, district attorney, data processing, planning commission and communications.

The hearing will be held at 9:45 a.m. in room 201 at the courthouse in Oregon City.

Firemen answer six calls

The Sandy Fire Department reported six calls during the week of Feb. 27 through March 6. There were two fires, one accident, one gas leak, one false alarm, and one first aid call.

A shed fire was reported Feb. 27 at the B. Anderson residence on the corner of Barnstedt Road and Dyal Road. The "fire" was revealed to be actually smoke from a wood stove with the door open, which had backed up into the shed.

On March 1, the S.F.D. was called to the scene of an auto accident on Highway 211, just north of Deep Creek, at 12:20 a.m. No injuries were sustained.

A false alarm was turned in the same day, on the corner of Bluff Road and Kelso Road.

The victim, L. Lynton, age 14, was proceeding on Main Street, when his bike wheel became stuck in a sewer grate. The bike toppled, and the boy sustained cuts and bruises on his face. He was treated by Dr. Leavitt, and sent home.

On Monday, March 5, a gas leak was reported at Adams Rib No. 2, across the street from the high school. The fire department cleared the building, and notified the gas company. The leak was repaired in about 20 minutes.

A fire alarm was turned in the same day, by Roy Brook, who saw smoke issuing from his neighbor's trailer, at the corner of Bluff Road and Hauglum Road. The trailer is owned by I. Bennett. The fire, which was confined to the bathroom, caused extensive smoke and heat damage to the rest of the unit. A large record collection was saved from destruction. Damage is estimated at about \$3,000. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

Mountain group seeks citizen input on plan

The Hoodland Planning Group (HPG) will hold an open meeting to discuss the proposed Mt. Hood Community comprehensive plan. The meeting is set for March 15, 7:30 p.m., at Welches Grade School.

"The members of the HPG are looking for input from people on the plan," said Col. Jack Baker, chairman of the HPG. The meeting will be for taking public testimony on the plan. The past meetings to discuss the plan have basically been for giving information on the plan and not public discussion.

So far, over 400 persons have attended

meetings on the mountain and in Portland where the comprehensive plan has been presented.

"The members of the HPG want to hear from those interested," said Baker, "the group will use this input to help formulate a position on the plan to be presented to the county when public hearings are held."

Baker said the local citizen advisory group has discussed the plan during several meetings and many varied opinions now exist concerning the overall acceptance of the plan as developed by CH2M-Hill engineering firm.

Burglaries involve four juveniles

Ten burglaries in the Boring area have been cleared with the admission of four juveniles, according to the Clackamas County Sheriff's spokesman.

The four juveniles were placed in custody of their parents and will be brought before juvenile authorities, the

spokesman said.

The police said several stolen properties including a rifle, TV sets, stereo equipment and ski boots were recovered.

The case broke Friday night and further investigation by the sheriff's office is in the process.

Hoodland Pharmacy robbed again

Hoodland Park Pharmacy in Wemme had unexpected visitor(s) early Tuesday morning, who took approximately \$125 worth of drugs, plus about \$40 in cash.

The intruder(s) entered the store through an exhaust fan opening, which had been boarded up after two previous break-ins, according to Gerry Barker, a partner

in the store. The bars had been chipped, and the concrete blocks had been chiseled, in order to facilitate entrance.

Barker reported that among drugs taken were Darvon, Empirin No. 3, Nembutol, and Ampicillin. The methodical robber(s) left behind a "shopping list", in alphabetical order, which included antibiotics as well as narcotics.

Damascus budget increases

Damascus School Principal Vernon Lang will present his proposed 1973-74 budget to the school board on March 13.

He will recommend a budget of \$625,227 compared to the current budget of \$504,910. The increase reflects the rapid growth in student numbers. There are now 645 students which is 100 more than at the beginning of the school year.

Student population has been growing at the rate of 25 to 30 per cent per year. A music teacher plus three staff teachers will be added. But, Lang says, the district will still be in a jam. He suggests it may be necessary to double-shift the first three grades or overload the classes from 30 to 35 students.

Even so the district will need

a new building by 1975. Lang said there would probably be a bond election for this purpose in May.

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Q. The veteran's marker at my grandfather's grave is almost unreadable. Is it possible to have this either repaired or replaced?

It is the government's policy to replace all veteran's headstones that have been damaged, or that have become unsightly or illegible due to weathering. It is also the policy of the armed services to mark permanently with a stone or a bronze plaque the grave of every deceased veteran of wartime or peacetime whose last service period was terminated by death or an honorable discharge.

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
