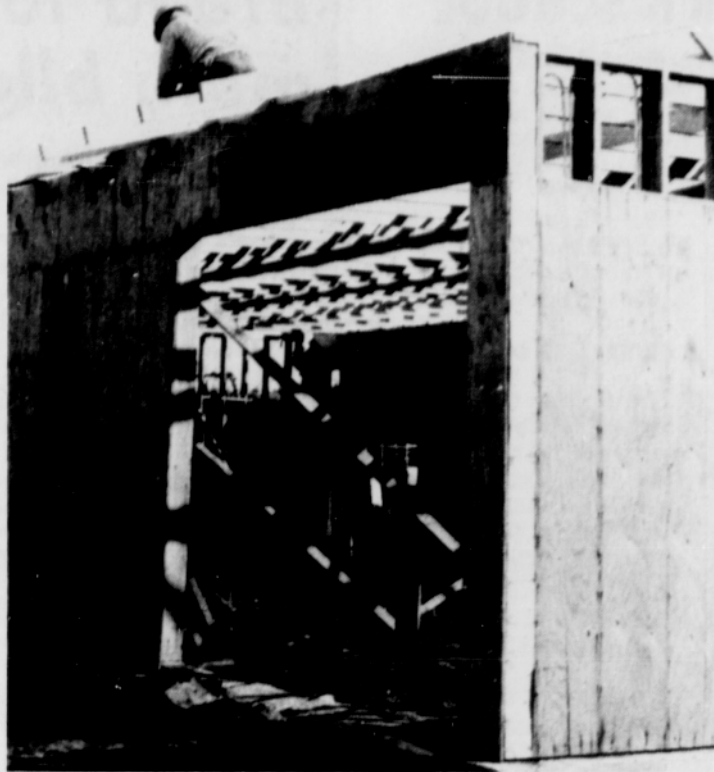
Farm land may remain

Legislature reports

Rep. Paul Walden District 56

Without question, the most hotly debated issue before this legislature has been the McCall-Eymann-Boe tax reform package.

In another of the "thrillers" which has become so typical of the battle, the Senate, and then the House acted favorably on the plan.

At least the final vote was sufficient to move the issue to the people for a May vote.

HB2004, and the enabling legislation, HJR 3 (which is what you will vote on) stalled in the Senate when the plan as scored by opponents, first defeated then passed after nearly six hours of debating and waiting.

Thursday last week, the House voted 39 to 21 in favor of the tax plan and 42 to 18 on the joint resolution.

It is important to note that the tax reform-school funding reform bill passed the House the first time on a 43 to 16 vote.

The plan includes two parts, one dealing with raising revenues and the other dealing with spending that revenue to provide 95 per cent state support of public elementary and secondary schools.

A new levy, a "business profits tax" will provide some of the revenue.

The first \$15,000 of "profit" is exempt from taxation. The next 60,000 is taxed at 1 per cent and everything over \$75,000 would be taxed at 2 per cent. The corporate excise-income tax is graduated from 4 per cent to 9 per cent.

There is a \$7.50 per \$1,000 statewide property tax on all real property other than owner occupied residences. The plan would also allow a 10 per cent credit on residential property tax.

If you rent a home or apartment, you would be eligible for a 9 per cent reimbursement on "net rent," which is what is left after you deduct the value of garbage service, water, electricity and so-on from your "rent."

In addition, a 12 per cent reimbursement would be allowed for low income renters. The bill requires the landlord to advise the tenant in writing what the "net rent" is.

If you live on a farm or ranch and own your home you would pay all of the taxes mentioned which apply to your case; however, you would be exempt from paying tax on "inventories," including farm machinery.

On the distribution side, "common school education" includes grades kindergarten through 12. Existing kindergartens would be 100 per cent state funded. New kindergartens would receive 50 per cent state funding the first year, and 100 per cent thereafter.

The next issue which is likely to make headlines is HJR 3. Many feel the ballot title is deceptive; so misleading in fact that the chairman of the House Consumer and Business Affairs Committee said it would not stand up to the tests of "truth in labeling," an issue now before us.

tax relief, but it does not inform the voter there would be sharp increases in taxes other than the property tax. It also talks of "preservation of local school control as the public policy of Oregon."

Opponents of 95 per cent state funding of local schools question whether this will remain policy, and thus may challenge the title to reflect their doubts. There may be a court challenge of the title.

HB2004 and HB2364 went to the Governor for his signature and was signed.

Fish Commission gives count

Figures released by the Fish Commission of Oregon showed that Columbia River gill-

netters landed an estimated 13,100 spring chinook and 1,600 winter steelhead during the

recently completed winter season.

This year's spring chinook catch compares favorably to the past three years' average of 13,900, according to the commission.

Steelhead landings, which for the past three years averaged 5,600 fish, were well below that figure and comprised only 11 per cent of the total estimated landings of both species combined as compared to 28 per cent for 1970-72.

According to Burnie Bohn, Fish Commission biologist in charge of Columbia River Investigations, the increased spring chinook catch during the past four winter seasons is attributable to a greater abundance of chinook salmon.

However, a later fishing season coupled with increased fishing effort due to rising chinook prices also helped account for the larger harvest.

Bohn pointed out that the steelhead catch of only 1,600 fish, extremely low in comparison to the past three years' average, is even lower when compared to the 1969-69 yearly average of 8,200 fish.

The decreased catch can be traced to this year's smaller run as compared to the exceptionally large runs of the past two years, said Bohn.

In addition, biologists checking gill-netters during the season noted that although the minimum allowable mesh size is 7-4", many fishermen were utilizing nets with an 8-inch mesh or larger which allows smaller fish to escape.

At the same time some gillnetters were observed returning live steelhead to the river and landing only dead ones.

fishery season ever set above Bonneville Dam, landings of around 500 steelhead and 50 sturgeon were reported.

Very few Indians participated in this fishery according to a spokesman for the Fish Commission.

Age-old situations such as peer-group pressures, parent-child conflicts, clerical concern for the young, state authority and influence groups are given contemporary emphasis so young audiences may understand and appreciate Shakespeare, explains Melo.

Dave Barduhn, MHCC music student, is creating a soft-rock soundtrack for the production. Language is the traditional text.

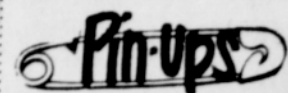
