Barlow was next with 53½ and Tillamook neeted 45½.

Many Pioneer participants were still working into the

track season gently, limiting the number of events they entered.

Ron Lamm was a winner for the Pioneers with a 10.9 clocking in the 100 yard dash. John Rae was timed in 25.1 to take the 220.

Ralph Peterson turned in an excellent 6-0 leap for the early season to win the high jump. Close behind in second place was Joe DeMarsh at 5-10.

Peterson also turned in the blue ribbon performance in the long jump with a 19-7 leap. In the javelin Tim Kelleer came up with an excellent 168-7

toss for a first. Jeff Jackson nailed down the win in the triple jump with a 37-8 effort.

Several Pioneers also turned in good efforts for second place finishes.

Joe Davenport claimed the runnerup slot in the high hurdles with a 19.2 clocking. Mike Whisner took a second in the mile with a 4:48.7 time.

In the 440 yard dash Mark Peterson placed second in 55.0. Sophomore Mike Opperman finished the 220 at 25.6 for a second place.

The 880 yard run runnerup

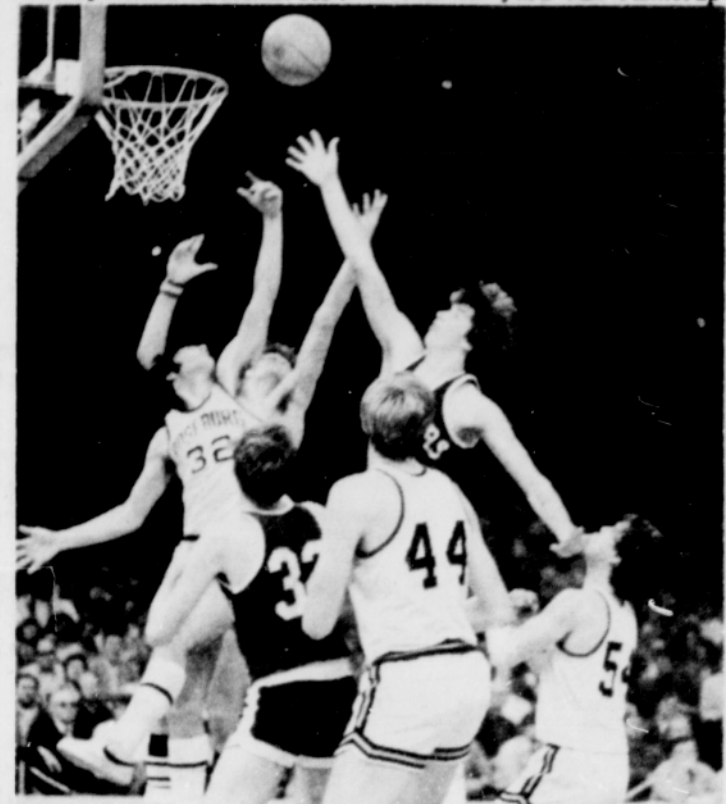
was John Dixon, who finished in 2:08.3. Opperman also nailed down a second in the long jump with a 17-7 effort.

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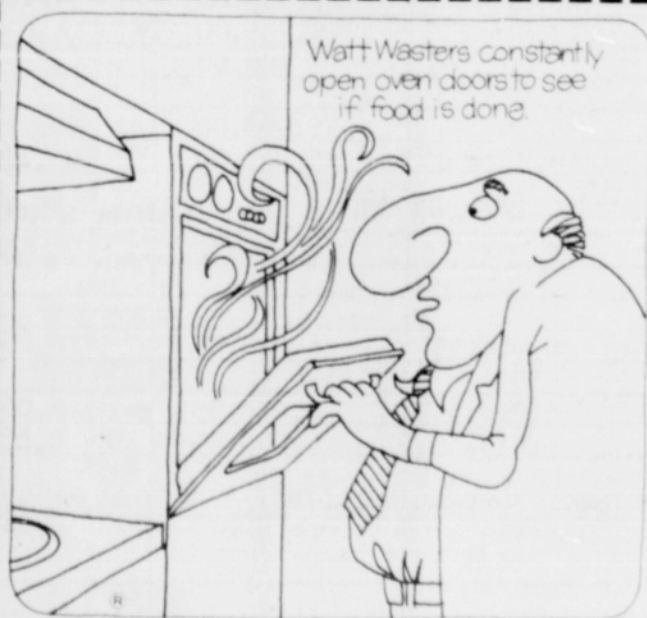

All entries receive a PGE Junior Watt Watcher's Kit.

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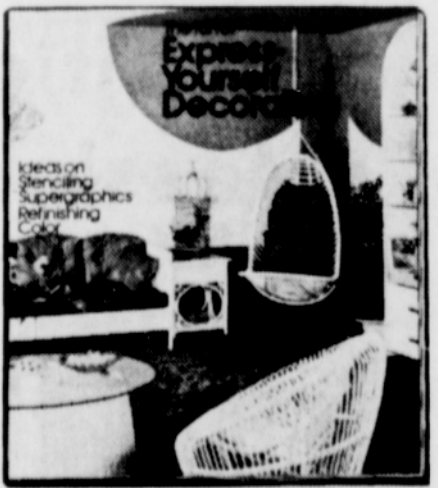
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Horse clinic set

For the second consecutive year, the Multnomah County Sheriff's Mounted Posse, in cooperation with other western Oregon riding enthusiasts, is sponsoring a horsemanship clinic Friday night, April 6, as a benefit for the American Cancer Society.

The 8 p.m. event will be held at Rogers Stables, 210th Ave. and S.E. Stark St.

Richard Shrake, well-known trainer and qualified judge of the American Horse Show Ring, will conduct the clinic which will emphasize bit control, general horsemanship and horse care. Shrake teaches riding professionally and has been an active horseman for more than 15 years.

Steve Yaw, chairman of this special event and captain of the Multnomah County Sheriff's Mounted Posse, said last year's event attracted people from as far away as Astoria.

"Because of the good response, we felt it worth repeating the horsemanship clinic as an opportunity for the serious riding enthusiasts to do their part in raising funds for the American Cancer Society," he said.
