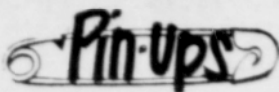


## BPW ready style show

## Sandy ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Thursday, March 29, members of the seventh grade science classes attended the Environmental Protection Agency public hearing at the Sheraton Hotel in Portland. The hearing was a culminating activity for students who participated in a unit of study about the tussock moth.

Interest groups represented at the hearing included Oregon Environmental Council, Oregon Wildlife Federation, Sierra Club, Northwest Steelheaders, Audubon Society, and the Wildlife Management Institute. Several individuals expressed their personal opinions about the tussock moth problem.

Barbara Boothby, Jean Beyers, Katie Krick, Dan Tomlin, Mark Rodriguez, and Richard TenEyck were the students attending the hearing. Mr. Hanson chaperoned the group.

The science classes had spent two weeks of study on the problem of how to control the tussock moth. Students were divided into interest groups such as Chamber of Commerce, Timber Industry, Farmers, Sportsmen Club, and others. These separate interest groups attacked the problem of eradication of the tussock moth which would be in the best interests of their particular group.

The students enjoyed their attendance at the hearing and learned that participating in a hearing is quite easy. Information gained from the hearing will be given to the students at school.

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Q. If it is true that the average funeral service costs somewhere around \$700, what do those people do who cannot afford this cost?
