Comment time extended on proposed regulations

Persons wishing to comment on proposed regulations governing use of off-road vehicles on National Forests have until May 1 to do so.

Comment time has been extended beyond the April 2 date specified in the Federal Register of March 2 (Volume 38, No. 41).

Copies of the Federal

Register, and a draft environmental statement on the proposed regulations, are available at Forest Supervisors' offices in Oregon and Washington, said Regional Forester Theodore A. Schlaffer.

However, he emphasized, all comments should be sent to Forest Service headquarters in

Washington, D.C. The address is U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, Division of Recreation, South Building, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Publication of the regulations is the first step toward establishing rules about use of off-road vehicles in the National Forests, with com-

pletion scheduled for the end of 1976. In the interim, a continuing planning process will provide for designation of specific area and trails for off-road vehicle use, or for restrictions on such use, and for closures to any or all use if necessary.

Before designations of areas or trails, advance notice will be

given to allow the public to participate in determining the action to be taken on individual National Forests, Schlaffer said.

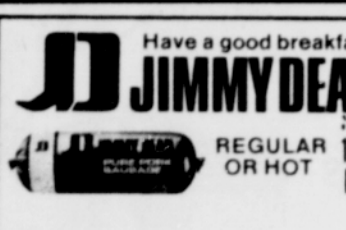
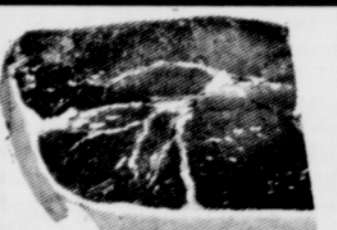
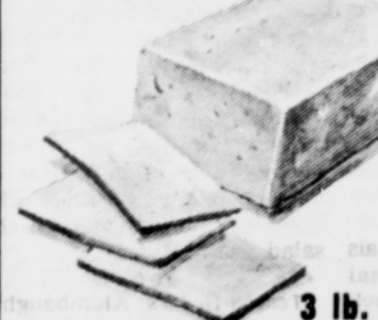
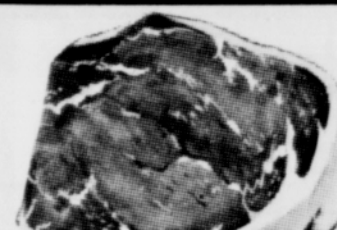
The proposed regulations grew out of a 1972 Presidential executive order. They are designed to set up a system to control indiscriminate use of off-road vehicles as a protec-

tion to the environment, as a safety precaution, as protection for wildlife, vegetation and other resources, and as a way to minimize conflict with other users of public land.
