

College to purchase St. Rita's

The Mt. Hood Community College board of education has given unanimous approval for the purchase of St. Rita's School (102 & NE Prescott).

The purchase is contingent upon the Maywood Park city council agreeing to certain revisions in the original list of conditions submitted by the council for the zone change.

MHCC board members met last week with the council and mutually agreed to reward a number of the 16 conditions.

In addition, the seller must meet all fire requirements and respective legal counsels must indicate purchase approval.

Mt. Hood's first community education center should begin operating early next fall given no further opposition to the plan.

Revised conditions allow 300 students in the building at one time—a figure in line with existing building codes. The original ceiling was 215 students.

The college agreed to provide adequate off-street parking so students wouldn't be forced to park in the streets. The college also agreed to stagger class hours as much as possible with those of Prescott School to minimize traffic hazards to children walking to and from school.

Center hours will be 8 a.m. - 10 p.m., Monday-Friday, and 8-6 on Saturdays.

Maywood Park Community Education Center will offer vocational and technical classes, college transfer programs, adult enrichment courses and general education development for adults wishing to earn their high school diploma.

The facility could also become a tutoring center and a veterans education center. The college also plans to rehabilitate students from correctional institutions. Various community services activities will be offered to residents of one of the most highly-populated areas in the district.

Cost of the facility is \$300,000. Mt. Hood plans to purchase the building and property with existing building funds and have the facility paid for in five years. The purchase has no effect on the college's tax rate.

Being born female has advantage

Born female is a decided advantage as far as life expectancy is concerned.

Contrary to the popular myth that the female child is more fragile and delicate than the male, the girl baby born today has a longer life expectancy than the boy baby.

Mrs. Roberta Frasier Anderson, extension specialist in family life, Oregon State University, reports that recent life expectancy tables from the National Center for Health Statistics highlight the difference between male and female life expectancy.

The newborn white female child has a life expectancy of 75.1 years compared with 67.8 years for the male child.

The infant who survives the first year of life has a longer life expectancy than when he was born.

For the female child the change is from 75.1 to 75.3 but the male child who survives the first year gains a greater advantage. His life expectancy changes from 67.8 to 68.2 years.

Life expectancy figures are based on averages and do not apply to any one individual, Mrs. Anderson emphasizes. Moreover, each year lived provides a different expectancy.

Many persons reaching age 70 or 80 believe that since they've outlived their life expectancy that they have few or no years left. On the contrary, there is a different life expectancy for each age.

For example, the white male who lives to age 70, now has a life expectancy of 10.4 years. But if he lives to age 85 the prediction is for 8.4 more years.

While life expectancy tables are interesting and helpful in making long range plans, Mrs. Anderson again emphasizes that they are predictors for the general population and do not apply to any one person.

The way to get the most out of a victory is to follow it up with another which makes it look small.—Henry S. Haskins.

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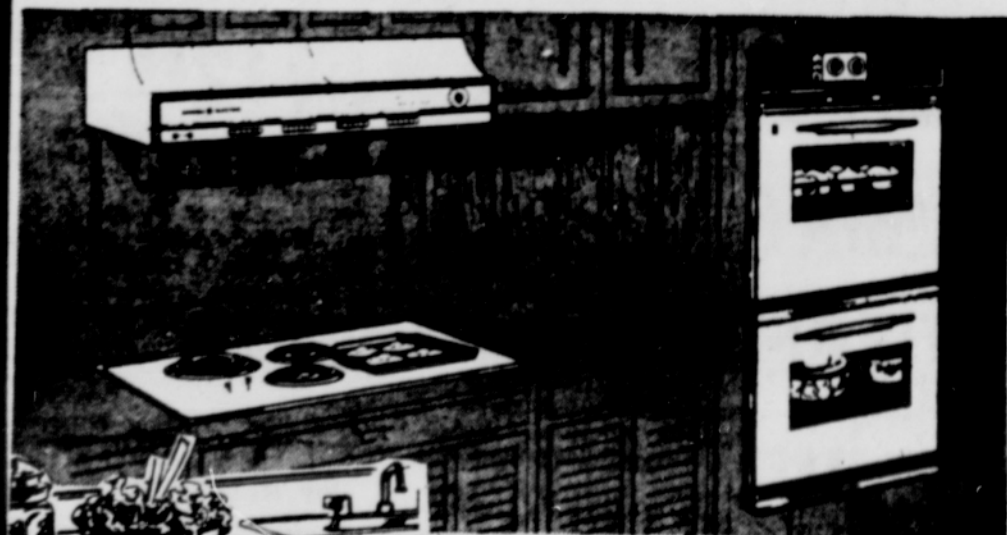
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
