

Jim Hartman to retire from college on June 30

Mt. Hood Community College's first employee, I.S. (Jim) Hartman, is retiring.

As the college's director of plant services, Hartman was instrumental in the logistics of campus construction and in landscaping the 172-acre main campus.

He plans to retire June 30. Mt. Hood will use his services on a consulting basis in the future.

Active in helping to form the community college district, Hartman was employed in June, 1965, as a special assistant to the board of education.

He became involved in the community college movement because of the experiences his daughter enjoyed while attending Montgomery Community College in Montgomery, Md.

Hartman felt the East Multnomah County area needed a college to offset impossible overcrowding at

Portland Community College. At that time, most high school graduates wanted to go to college but found it difficult to find a place to go, he says.

Actually, this is "Cap" Hartman's second retirement. He was appointed to the Naval Academy at Annapolis in 1929 and graduated in 1933. He became captain of the USS Electra and, later, commander of the submarine, USS Barbero.

He spent most of his time on submarines until 1958 when he transferred to Washington, D.C., to work with the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He retired from the Navy in 1960 and returned to his home in Sandy.

Hartman feels the tremendous growth of Mt. Hood Community College is due to timing. He says the community was very responsive to community colleges and wanted one in the area. He credits the original board and President Earl Klapstein as being instrumental in helping the

community realize the potential of a full-fledged community college campus.

Initial groundbreaking on the south campus is Hartman's fondest recollection. County Commissioners from Multnomah, Clackamas and Hood River counties shared a three-handled shovel for the ceremonies.

"Action" describes Cap Hartman. He says he's happiest when the action is heaviest, and when it dries up, he looks for more.

He sees continued growth for MHCC...and new challenges. "Even when the campus is 100 per cent complete, the challenges will remain," Hartman said, "but like the past, Mt. Hood will overcome these challenges and continue to provide a great educational institution for this ever-growing community."

Cap Hartman still sees

"action" in his future. He says he has a house that "... hasn't been painted in 13 years." He also wants to develop further his land in Sandy and hopes to become an Oregon "tourist."

He and his wife Elizabeth plan to tour the state in a series of short trips.

Hartman was honored for his outstanding service to the college during Charter Week activities, April 23-27.

He was presented with a bronze plaque to be placed on a Sequoia Redwood donated originally to the campus by Hartman himself. The plaque identifies the tree as, "The Hartman Redwood," and further notes that Hartman was the college's first employee.

Highway tax funds released

The Oregon State Highway Commission announced distribution of \$6,310,281.12 in highway-user tax funds to the 36 counties of the state.

The allocation is based on the statutory 20 per cent for the period January 1 through March 31, 1973. The funds come from the following sources: motor vehicle registration and operators' license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax motor carrier fees, and fines and penalties collected for violations of the size and weight statutes where complaints are made by the Highway Division weighmasters.

The allocation to each county is based on the number of vehicles registered in it. The allocations to Clackamas County were based on 136,386 registered vehicles amounted to \$505,885.58
