## Estacada's first night club called wicked

The year 1905 brings to mind pleasant memories.

Teddy Roosevelt was President, gold and silver coins were worth face value, income taxes, Social Security, Medicare, radio, TV and hippies were unheard of.

Uncle Sam was at peace with all the world, and the Lewis and Clark World's Fair was in full bloom in Portland.

Estacada had recently been incorporated, O.W.P.R.R., with Yours Truly as Agent, was in full operation, people were moving to the new city and the boom was on. Four saloons seemed to spring up overnight; logging camps and sawmills were unable to supply demands.

Among the newcomers was a Major Andree who purchased a new building and in a short time fitted it into a rooming house with a saloon on the ground floor. All four drinking parlors furnished free lunches, beer was five cents a mug, and each place tried to outdo the other with excellent cuisine.

Carnegie Hall and Chicago had their opera—Estacada had Ed Hunt and his fiddle. He was a friendly man and always willing to entertain. Being unable to read music he composed his own. He operated a second hand store and at night divided and displayed his musical talents between the four saloons free.

Major Andree's place being the last to get started was not doing well. He decided to employ Mr. Hunt full time evenings for free beer, lunch and a dollar. A few nights later Ed got his long beard mixed up with the bow and string. The Major, in his cups as usual, ordered him out of the place.

After the foregoing event the Major went to Portland and upon his return told me he had engaged a troop of musicians and would open a "Night Club" the following Monday night. He asked me to direct the musicians to his place of business. The Major was busy preparing the place for the grand opening using a pool table for the stage in the rear along with the piano. He took out all the chairs and tables and left only the bar.

Monday morning when the

train from Portland arrived at 8:43 a.m. Judge Compton, the conductor, helped three lovely young ladies and the baggage Truly, all smiles, escorted the "Dolly Sisters" to the Night Club. Later that day they strolled the 12 foot wide board walks looking the town over. Several of the town merchants were seen sweeping the sidewalks in front of the establishments as the gals passed by.

The news spread to the logging camps and that night a small crowd enjoyed the show. me included. The girls sang and played various instruments, among them "Shade of the Old Apple Tree," "Sidewalks of New York," "Frankie and Johnny," "After the Ball" and "Meet Me in St. Louis." Between the numbers they danced.

It goes without saying the Major had a broad smile knowing he had hit the jackpot.

The following days the gals continued their daily walks and each night crowds grew greater. However, dark clouds appeared. Word had reached a certain lady who was very active in the Womens Suffrage movement and the W.C.T.U. We'll call her Mrs. H and when we say active, we mean active. Mrs. H called a meeting of the ladies of the town and told them something had to be done to save their husbands. Seems she knew several who attended the Night Club. She elected herself as spokesman of the group to contact the city fathers and Town Marshall Bill Jones to drive the "Dolly Sisters" out of town. They told her there was no law giving the
