Goodwill truck sets stop here

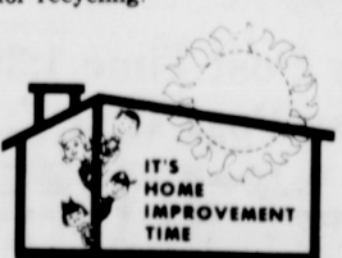
