Commissioners table natural river proposals

The Clackamas County Commissioners promised to rule on a proposed air strip in the Clackamas Natural River area on Wednesday (Yesterday). The results of the meeting were not known at press time.

The commissioners failed to rule on the air strip in their meeting held last week.

The air strip would be on three parcels of land in the Logan area. At the hearing last week, among those who spoke on the matter were Mrs. Hazel Stevens of Eagle Creek. She

opposed the proposed air strip. The commissioners delayed action on the proposal awaiting

County okays Eagle Creek zoning request

Minimum one-acre zoning in the Eagle Creek area may not stop the establishment of a gravel operation.

The Clackamas County Planning Commission moved Monday night to recommend the zoning for a one-square mile section of land in the Eagle Creek area.

Most of the residents appearing in favor of RA-1 zoning

a ruling from the county's district attorney's office.

The commissioners last week

also tabled a request by a Vancouver, Wash. resident for a "back to nature retreat" in

voiced concern over a proposed sand and gravel facility now being prepared near Judd Road. Neighbors claimed that their tranquil residential area

would be ruined by the establishment of a rock crusher in an area reportedly leased to the Western Sand and Gravel Co. for five years.

Nine owners of property in the area, comprising more than

52 per cent of the residents, had petitioned the Planning Commission to zone the area before the gravel operation was started.

However, Jim Hall, planning director, said the operation would be allowed to continue under the grandfather clause if the developers had received a permit before the zoning was approved.

the natural river area near Barton.

This was tabled to allow an inspection tour of the proposed site.

A single-family home requested by Raymond F. Kolberg, Eagle Creek, within the natural river corridor was approved by the commissioners with the stipulation that the parcel be approved by the county soil scientist for subsurface sewage. The site is northwest of Estacada in an area known as Paradise Park.

The request of Jake D. Ault of

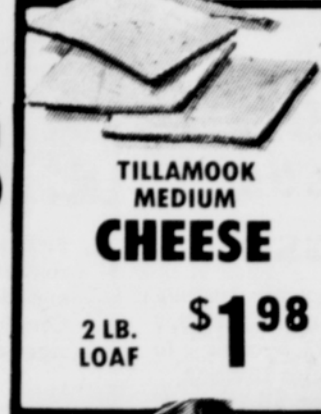
Eagle Creek to improve and enlarge his existing mobile home park from 10 to 54 units was also tabled pending a legal interpretation by the county District Attorney.

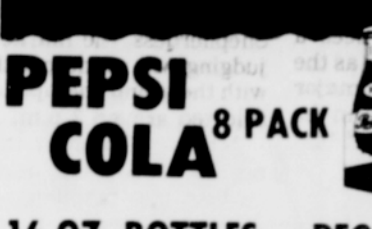
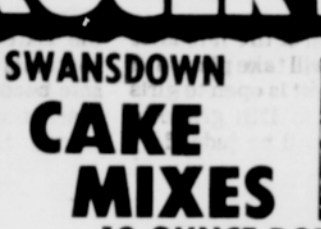
Planning director Jim Hall noted at the meeting he felt the park expansion was not allowable under the intent of the measure.
