What's Cooking?

BOILED TURBOT

Rinse Turbot fish steaks but do not dry. Sprinkle with dehydrated onion and seasoning salt.

Broil on second rack down from the heat (5" to 6"), about 10 minutes on first side, turn and broil until browned and fish will flake when separated with a fork. Serve drippings over fish.

When served sprinkle with lemon pepper.—From the files of Mrs. Anton Bryant, Sandy. This is Ruth's original recipe. It is a great one for weight watchers, or anyone.

GREEN BEAN CASSEROLE

2 cans green beans, cooked
1 can mushroom soup, undiluted

Potato chips crushed
1 large onion, chopped
1 cup grated cheese

Place green beans in casserole. Mix with onion. Pour soup over bean mixture. Sprinkle top with crushed potato chips. Bake in 375 degree oven until bubbling, about 25-30 minutes.—From the files of Mrs. Roland Shanks, Gadsden, Ala.

ZUCCHINI BREAD

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

3 eggs
1 cup cooking oil
1 1-3 cups sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla

2 cups shredded zucchini

3 cups flour
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
3 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup nut meats

Beat the eggs until foamy. Add the oil, sugar, vanilla and zucchini and mix well. Sift together and add the flour and other dry ingredients. Add nuts. Divide into 2 greased and lightly floured loaf pans, or three smaller ones.—From the files of Mrs. Laura Stiffanson, Melvin Haneberg's sister, who lives in Portland. Edna Haneberg gave it to me. This bread is moist and delicious. Simply spread it with butter or softened creamed cheese—great to take on picnics.

Now that fresh strawberries are in the local markets and are reasonably priced you will want to make Feather Cake to use for shortcake. This is a Centennial recipe given to me by Mrs. Fred Decker. Let us not lose the favorite recipes of our Mother's and Grandmother's.

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NAKED APPLE PIE

Beat one egg in middle-size bowl.
Add:
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
Pinch of salt

4 cup flour sifted with 1 teaspoon baking powder
2 medium apples, pared, then chopped or sliced
1/2 cup pecans or walnuts, chopped

Mix all ingredients well and spread mixture in a greased 9" pie plate. Bake 1/2 hour at 350 degrees. As it bakes it tends to separate with the dough becoming a crust and the apples and nuts coming to the top.—From the files of Mrs. Sandra Nadine Bowie, Portland.
