George Rohweder

Funeral Services for George J. Rohweder, 72, of 515 SE Rene Ave., will be Thursday, 2 p.m., at Bateman Funeral Chapel with vault entombment at Riverview Abbey Mausoleum.

He was born in Jevensstedt, Germany, and died at his home May 27 after suffering a heart attack.

He came to the U.S. in 1923 and lived in Boring from 1929 until 1971 when he moved to Gresham to make his home. In his early years he worked for Oregon Bulb Farms and from 1934 until 1946 he worked for Portland Water Dept. at Dodge Park. In his later years he worked for Koch Mill in Sandy as a millwright and later as nightwatchman until he retired in 1965.

He married Katherine Ohm in Boring in 1930 and she survives as does his son, George W. of Sandy and five grandchildren. His sisters, Helen Claussen of Portland, Anna Wieben of Germany and his brother Willy Rohweder in Germany also survive. He was active in the Senior Citizens group in Gresham.

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Don Allen

Don Allen, 77, a long time resident of the Estacada area died there May 29.

Allen was born in Hood River, the son of W.H. and Carrie Allen. He was raised and received his education in Hood River and as a young boy he was a member of and helped organize the second Boy Scout troop in the state.

In 1915 he moved with his family to Bull Run where he helped operate a general store and motel.

In 1917 he joined the U.S. army and served in France and later the occupation of Germany. After leaving the service in 1918 he returned to Bull Run to continue operation of the general store.

In 1924 he married D. Kathleen Currin and for a short time they lived in Susanville, Calif. They returned to Bull Run where he resided until 1931 when they returned to Susanville, where he was employed by the FGS Co. until 1947.

He served on the Lassen Co. draft board for 15 years and from 1960 to 1969 was Lassen County purchasing agent.

In 1969 he returned to Oregon where he has operated a tree farm.

Extension staff adds economist

A new Extension Home Economist has been appointed to the Clackamas County Extension staff.

Mrs. Marilyn Lunner will begin work June 1, according to Joe Cox, director of the Oregon State University Extension Service. She fills the position left vacant by the death of Helen McDowall.

As an OSU Extension Agent, Mrs. Lunner is a part of a statewide organization that provides informal and voluntary education for both adults and youth in every Oregon county.

In addition to home economics, the OSU Extension Service conducts programs in agriculture, forestry, 4-H and youth, marine science, and community development.

Mrs. Lunner will organize and teach educational programs in home economics for families and organized groups in Clackamas County. In addition, she will train volunteer leaders involved with Extension family living groups in the Portland metropolitan area.

Mrs. Lunner has been working as an Extension Agent in family resource management on the OSU campus in Corvallis.

She initially was appointed to the OSU Extension staff in 1968 as an Extension Home Economist in Multnomah County.

A native of Nebraska, Mrs. Lunner previously served as an Extension Home Economist and Home Economics Extension editor at the University of Nebraska.

Mrs. Lunner received a bachelors degree in home economics at the University of Nebraska in 1961, and has taken advanced study in journalism and broadcasting at American University, Washington, D.C., in 1967.

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
