

Top two Orient students to speak at graduation

Jackie Firestenberg and Denise Hall have been named the top two students in this year's eighth grade graduating class at Orient School.

They were to speak at the graduation exercise Wednesday, June 6, at Barlow High School.

Eighty-seven eighth graders are graduating in the Class of 1973.

Graduation awards were to be given for scholarship and citizenship by Mauro Potestio, principal.

The All-American Award for boy and girl will be presented.

This award is based on the participation in extra-curricular activities as well as honor work in classes.

Orient School will offer a reading program this summer sponsored by the federal government under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965.

Gayle Goodrich, Brigitte Stout and David Hughes from the Orient staff will also work in the program.

The project is designed to upgrade the reading and comprehension levels of students who are having dif-

ficulty in the science and art of reading. Students who have been identified by their teachers as having reading difficulties have been invited to participate.

Classes will begin immediately after the current school year and will conclude July 6.

Classes will be daily from 1 to 4 p.m. in the East Orient School building.

Voters in the Orient School District turned down a bond issue Tuesday for the first time in 20 years, according to Charles Carlon, superintendent.

He said that in the last 20 years only one tax levy had been turned down. However, on that occasion it was passed on the second vote.

They voted 264-153 against a \$1,000,000 bond issue which would have been used to build a new 7th and 8th grade building on Altman road.

Failure of the bond issue, according to Supt. Charles Carlon, means the district will have to consider a year-round school or double-shifting to meet its student population problems.
