College students benefit from loans

Mt. Hood Community College students received nearly a half-million dollars in Guaranteed Student Loans during the past year. For many, it was the difference between working full time and getting an education.

College figures show MHCC students receiving \$462,000 in 1972-73. This is almost a \$100,000 increase over 1970-71 figures of \$371,000.

Guaranteed Student Loans are made by nearly 20,000 participating banks, savings and loan associations, credit unions and other eligible lenders across the country. Students in approximately 8,300 colleges and universities are helped.

Volume of loans is dependent entirely on voluntary participation of lenders. Total amount of loans has grown from \$840 million in 1969-70 to \$1.3 billion in 1971-72.

The Bureau of Higher Education credits college financial aid offices as indispensable in the sound and prudent origination of these loans.

In a letter to MHCC President Earl Klapstein, William M. Simmons, Jr., the bureau's director of insured loans, commented, "I would like to extend the sincere appreciation of the Office of Education to you and your financial aid staff for your tireless assistance to the many students who are depending on guaranteed loans to finance part of their education costs."

MHCC director of financial aid, Dr. Wilfred Burgess, noted that MHCC students also benefited greatly from Economic Opportunity Grants and the college work-study program.

Oregon fryer industry grows

Young chickens may well be the most researched animal in this much-researched world. Continuous study has changed the Oregon fryer's genes, diet, family life, physical environment and life expectancy. According to the Agri-Business Council, this research has even changed the fryer's personality.

Back about 1940, the fryer could best be described as a "scrawny, blue-looking object that tastes good in spite of its unfortunate appearance." Today's fryer, with his genes all properly rearranged, looks as good as it tastes. Last year 15.2 million of these modern fryers, with broad breasts and thick drumsticks, were grown in Oregon.

The fryer's diet, too, has gone through some startling changes in recent years. In the 1940's, fryers reached three pounds in fourteen weeks on four and one-half pounds of feed for each pound of chicken. Now, three-pound fryers are grown in eight weeks with just 2 1/4 pounds of feed per pound of chicken.

In bygone days, growers would explain their 20 by 20 foot chicken coops partly as a measure of disease control and partly as a means of preventing piling up and cannibalism. An unaccustomed noise might cause a whole population of

fryers to pile up in a corner with many resulting deaths; or an epidemic of cannibalism might occur, eliminating many lives.

Hospital equipment donated

New equipment for use with patients who have respiratory or heart disease is now in use at Dwyer Memorial Hospital. It is the gift of the Clackamas County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

The electric exercise treadmill can control the speed of walking from 1 to 10 miles per hour and control the incline from 0 to 25 degrees. It is used in pulmonary function stress-exercise-testing and also in electrocardiogram stress-exercising. The value and importance of the treadmill stress-testing procedures lies in the ability to detect disease not easily found at such an early stage... as unsuspected or "silent" coronary heart disease.

The spirometer will do complete pulmonary function testing and uses a polaroid camera for readouts.

"One of the things our association has wanted is quality medical care for everyone," said Joe M. Bernard, Jr., President of the Association, in announcing this gift. "We feel the use of this equipment will help our physicians and the hospital staff give the residents of our community better health care."

"Donations to Christmas Seals have made possible this gift totaling \$3,250 which was purchased from the reserve fund of the Association. It is a direct return to the people of Clackamas County for their whole-hearted support of our program through the years."

Today, it is not uncommon to see 40,000 fryers in one pen. Neither the 40,000 chickens nor their owners seem concerned about the old problems of piling up or cannibalism.

Perhaps the geneticists, besides getting rid of the scrawny blue look through complicated breeding techniques, have also eliminated some of the fryer's antisocial tendencies. Or perhaps the streamlined diet and better physical environment have reduced tension and frustration.

In any event, contented Oregon fryers keep increasing in numbers while producing tastier drumsticks and white meat faster and more efficiently than ever before. Growers received \$9.8 million for their fryers last year.

A trend in the industry sees growers becoming fewer in number but larger in volume. Of the state's fryer growers, Delmer Stutsman's of Canby is the largest. Each year, he

raises 600,000 fryers. Fryers bearing the "Grown in Oregon" label can go from the farm to store in the same day, insuring consumers they are purchasing the freshest, most flavorful fryers obtainable.

Since 1958, the Oregon Fryer Commission has been busy explaining the advantages of buying fresh fryers. During this period, a dramatic 62 percent increase in the consumption of local, mentally well-balanced fryers has occurred.

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
