House passes bill against double tax

If the bill passes the Legislature and is signed by the governor it will require the City-County Charter Commission to change its formula, according to Otto.

The commission, up to now, has insisted that opted out areas would pay the same taxes as others areas; even though the services are not used.

This is a bill introduced and championed by Rep. Glenn Otto, D-Troutdale.

The bill sets the ratio of the amount of taxes opted out cities will pay to the new central government.

Now Gresham pays \$5.00 to the county. In following years, should the new government costs go up, Gresham would pay the same percentage as represented by the \$5.00.

This ratio holds true of

Troutdale, Wood Village and Fairview except that those cities now pay an additional \$2.96 to Fire District 10.

The bill now goes to the Senate local government committee, of which Sen. Vern Cook, D-Gresham is a member.

A blow was struck against double taxation Monday for cities that opt out of city-county consolidation.

HB 2627 was passed by a solid majority of 46 to 11 with three excused.

A special entertainment feature will be a concert by the Valley Chapel Baptist Choir. Refreshments will be served.

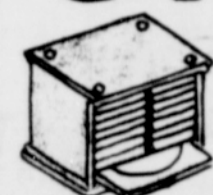

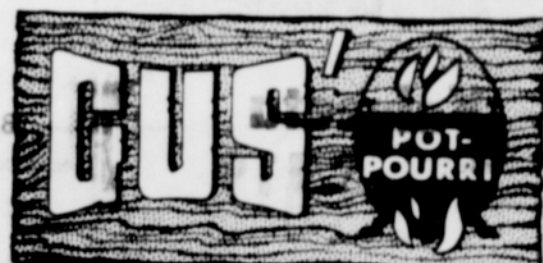

College schedules heavy art program

Mt. Hood Community College unveiled its Art Mall (classroom complex) last fall and students loved it.

A large summer art program should prove attractive to regular students and members of the community who are interested in taking one or two special classes.

Mt. Hood's first summer session gets underway June 19 and the second session starts July 24. Each session is five weeks long.

Ceramics, sculpting, jewelry, glasscraft, drawing, painting, graphics, fabrics and weaving are all on the agenda.

Ceramics will be offered both sessions with a special section being offered all day Friday allowing time for kiln building, raku and exploration of native clays.

Sculpting will be taught first session with a special two-week workshop on tap for the second session. Bill Tunberg, MFA graduate of USC, will lead the workshop. He's presently establishing a studio in Hillsboro.

Jewelry will be offered in a regular transfer class, as well as a special evening section and

a two-week workshop. Work will include castings using native material.

Glasscraft is new this summer. It'll be offered second session and will include glazing, cutting, leading stained glass and glassblowing.

Drawing, painting and watercolor will be offered during the day and evening. A special graphics workshop is also on tap. The workshop is an open session for applying principles and techniques of lettering, printing processes and display to specific situations in teaching or other group work.

Two terms of weaving will be offered—one in the regular session and a two-week workshop in second session.

Two terms of fabrics will be offered as part of the regular three-term sequence in the allied art program. First term work will concentrate on fibercraft, such as macrame and stitchery. The second session will introduce dying techniques in batik and tie dye, as well as screenprinting on fabric.

Northwest hoop clinic

Top stars from pro and college ranks will take part in the clinic, which is under the direction of Eagle hoop coach Duane Brady.

\$166,700 in new equipment for better telephone service.

Mr. R. H. Knutson, Oregon state manager, announced today that installation work has begun on new equipment for the Sunnyside exchange central office. The new equipment will provide a substantial boost in capacity for the Sunnyside exchange. Upon completion of the installation, many customers will be able to obtain upgrading of their present telephone service, such as conversion to single-party telephone service.

The new equipment project is budgeted at \$166,700 and is part of an overall 1973 service improvement program totaling \$2,281,900. It is another step toward the company's long-term goal of providing single-party service to any and all customers requesting it.
