Two pre-cooked chicken breasts, and if so desired, one, or maybe two thighs well cubed or cut up.
2 or 3 slices of bread, crust removed and diced
¼ cup dried celery
¼ cup bell pepper

¼ cup grated cheese
¼ cup mayonnaise
¼ cup onion, chopped
1 can cream of mushroom soup

1-3 cups sweet milk
1 egg, well-beaten
Into well-greased casserole put broken pieces of bread. (I cut it in squares with scissors). Then add to bread in casserole, the diced chicken, celery, pepper, cheese, mayonnaise, onion and mix. In another bowl mix soup, milk, and well-beaten egg and pour over bread crumb-chicken mixture in casserole. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes. Sprinkle top with a little more grated cheese. Makes six individual casseroles or one large one.—From the files of Mrs. W. W. Turner, Gadsden, Ala.

ZUCCHINI CHUNK PICKLES
1 gallon peeled chunks of zucchini. Mix in plastic pail or crock container with 1 cup hydrated lime to 1 gallon water. Let stand 24 hours. Stir often as lime settles. Pour off water and rinse well. Let stand in cold water 3 hours. Pour off water. Pour cold brine (recipe below) over chunks and let stand 24 hours. Simmer 35 minutes, then seal in hot sterilized jars.

Brine
6 cups vinegar
10 cups sugar
3 Tablespoons mixed pickling spices
2 Tablespoons salt
Green food coloring (use sparingly as color deepens)

Dogwood may change

Your pink flowered dogwood hasn't reached a certain life milestone if it suddenly sports white flowers or sprinkles white blossoms among the normal pink.

Chances are that it is quite healthy but merely playing tricks on you as explained by Wilbur W. Burkhardt, area extension agent.

Flowering trees are the product of a special variety being propagated by grafting. A scion from a tree having the desired variety is placed on a root and small portion of the trunk of another commonly available variety easily grown from seed.

All goes well as long as the root plays its assigned part of gathering plant food and water for the grafted top portion that is to produce the coveted flowers of special color and

type.

The startling surprise comes from an un-noticed sprout growing from the root and finding its way into the upper portions of the tree where it remains inconspicuous until it suddenly produces flowers of another color among those of the color usually found on the tree.

Burkhardt suggests removal of sprouts from below the graft unless close observation is made to prevent a take-over by the intruder.

Rootstocks of certain species may have more vigor than the variety it is hosting. For this reason, any indication of the sprout to overshadow the superior colored variety should be regarded as cause for immediate removal by pruning.

All pruning wounds must be coated with tree healing compounds immediately to prevent rot invasion.

Q. How long must my husband and I have been married to qualify me, after his death, for a widow's pension?
A. Providing all other qualifications are met, you are legally the widow if:
SOCIAL SECURITY: You and your husband were validly married or, if the validity of your marriage is questionable, then if the laws of the state in which your husband lived will allow you to inherit his intestate personal property.
VETERANS: You were married for any length of time before: Dec. 14, 1944 for World War I widows; Jan. 1, 1957 for World War II widows; Feb. 1, 1965 for Korean Conflict widows; before the expiration of 10 years following termination of the Vietnam era for Vietnam widows; OR you were married continuously for one or more years OR you are the mother of the veteran's child born before or after marriage.
CIVIL SERVICE (Federal): You were married for at least two years immediately prior to your husband's death or if you are the mother of his child born of your marriage.
