

# DEQ rule threatens closure of Reynolds

Proposed standards for fluoride emissions could close the Reynolds Metals Troutdale plant.

Diarmuid F. O'Scannlain, director, Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), has proposed that the emission standard be set at one pound per ton of aluminum produced.

A company spokesman said these standards could not be met.

Emission now at Troutdale is 10 pounds per ton.

The federal Environmental

Protection Agency (EPA) is considering setting the standard at two pounds per ton.

The DEQ director has set a meeting for June 29 with the aluminum companies operating in the state to consider his proposal.

Harry Helton, manager of the Troutdale plant, said that the DEQ proposed standard could not be met under present technology.

In a statement to The Outlook he said, "We have had many meetings with staff members of the DEQ for the last several

months and we have consistently pointed out that new standards would have to be based on available technology.

Each recipient will be presented with an Oregon Scholar certificate by the commission. In addition, Gov. Tom McCall and School Supt. Dale Parnell will send letters of tribute to the Oregon Scholars of each high school. Most high schools also will incorporate Oregon Scholar award presentations into their graduation ceremonies.

## Fire department has busy week

Although the Sandy Fire Department had eleven calls for the week of May 29 through June 5, none of them was a major fire in the district. Three first aid calls were reported, along with two mutual assists, two car fires, and one each false alarm, smoke scare, car fire, auto accident plus another accident.

Friday, May 29, the department responded to a car fire in the parking lot of the Sandy Rexall Drug Store. The car, owned by Mrs. Justice of Box

142, Boring, had the fire in the engine compartment.

The same day, the Boring Fire Department requested mutual aid for a large barn fire on Highway 224 in Eagle Creek. The barn was destroyed.

An alarm was turned in by Sandy High School, Thursday, May 31, which proved to be false.

The same day, first aid was given to Mrs. Evans, Rt. 1 Box 390, Sandy. Oxygen was administered for a breathing problem.

Another first aid call was answered Sunday, June 3, at the Sladky residence, 303 E. Sandy Heights. Mr. Sladky, who appeared to be suffering a heart attack, was transported to Gresham Hospital by the Sandy Ambulance.

The Sandy Fire Department answered a third first aid call at the Reusser residence, Rt. 2, Box 1717D, Sandy. Mrs. Reusser, who had passed out, was given oxygen.

The same day, a call was answered for a smoke scare at the Mel Lamb residence at 408 Hood Street.

Also on June 3, a fire was reported in a car owned by Mr. Holtman, Rt. 1, Box 1373, Sandy. Mr. Holtman was traveling on Terra Firma Drive in Cherryville, when the hood on the car blew open. After he stopped to close it, the car rolled over a bank, and the motor burst into flames. The fire was confined to the motor area.

Another mutual aid call came June 3 to assist Estacada Fire Department at Mt. Hood Cleaners in Estacada. The engine was recalled as it was leaving the station.

Aid was given at the scene of an automobile accident on Highway 26 Monday, June 4. Mrs. Schmidt of Rt. 1, Box 1453, had lost control of her car, which ran into a ditch. She was transported to the Gresham Community Hospital with extensive cuts and bruises.

The same day, a call came in for aid at an accident near the Bull Run power plant. The call was handled by the Oregon State Police and the Clackamas County Medical Investigator.

## Volunteers slate station painting

The Sandy Rural Fire District fire hall in Sandy will take on a new look this weekend when the volunteers put the brush to the building.

Last weekend over 20 volunteers got together for a breakfast and work party. They prepared the building for the painting party slated for Sunday.

Each of the volunteers worked for about six hours last week preparing the building for its new coat of paint, according to a spokesman for the volunteers.

All the labor is being donated and the fire district is supplying the paint. This project had been planned for late this year, but the volunteers are in the "Centennial Spirit" and want the job completed as soon as possible.

The volunteer organization has also paid to have the parking lot at the station repaired. The volunteers paid to have the job completed now and the district will return the funds to the volunteer organization when the district has funds available.

## First Wildlife youth camp slated

High school age Oregonians will attend the first Wildlife Conservation Youth Camp June 11-16 at the 4-H Education Center near Salem, according to H. Joe Myers, assistant state Extension director at Oregon State University.

The camp will provide young people an opportunity to better understand the ecological importance of wildlife, and proper management of their habitat. Seventy-five youngsters have been selected for the camp. Representing Clackamas County will be Dwight Johnson, Gladstone. Johnson is being sponsored by Milwaukie Rod and Gun Club.

The 720 acre 4-H Education Center is eight miles northwest of Salem. It has hundreds of

varieties of plant life, 11 ponds, and all the species of wildlife native to the Willamette Valley, Myers said.

Workshops will be taught by staff members of the Oregon State Game Commission, the OSU Extension Service and the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife at OSU.

Subjects covered will include food chains in aquatic environments, habitat requirements for upland birds, fishery management of the Willamette River system, and blacktail deer management.

The camp is being sponsored by the Oregon Wildlife Federation and the Isaac Walton League, in cooperation with the OSU Extension Service and the Oregon State Game Commission.


