

'Ma' Bender plans open house Sunday at winery

"Ma" Bender is second and trying hard to be Number 1 in Harvest seasons begin

The Employment Division's Rural Manpower Service report states that weather conditions have been excellent throughout Oregon with drought conditions in some areas relieved by some much-needed rain.

The strawberry harvest is starting in the Willamette valley with adequate help except for Gresham and Oregon City where a slight shortage will exist until about June 8 when school is out. Approved housing is very limited in the Willamette valley, the Rural Manpower Service reports.

The cherry harvest is to start June 8 to 11 at The Dalles with a shortage of 100 pickers expected by June 15. Cherry harvest is to start at Milton-Freewater June 8 to 10 with an anticipated shortage of 50 to start. At Salem, Grants Pass, Eugene and McMinnville, cherry harvests are scheduled to

begin June 15 and at Hillsboro, June 25, all with adequate help. Limited approved housing is prevalent in all areas.

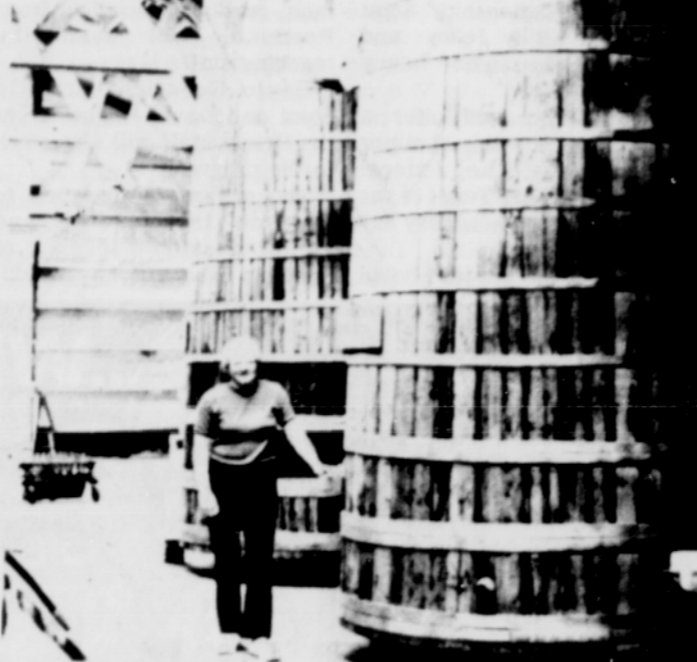
The asparagus harvest is 90 per cent complete at Milton-Freewater and Pendleton with adequate help.

The pea harvest has started at Milton-Freewater and Pendleton with a slight shortage of viner mechanics and equipment operators at Milton-Freewater and adequate help at Pendleton.

Pole bean stringing is to start June 8 at Albany.

Raspberry harvests are to start June 15 at Eugene; June 20 at Gresham; June 25 at Oregon City and July 2 at Hillsboro and Lebanon.

Apple and Pear thinning has started at Hood River with a shortage of 50 thinners; Milton-Freewater area has started apple thinning and is short 15 thinners; and Medford area will start pear thinning June 11 to 15 with adequate help.

Clackamas County Hospitals," said Bernard. "Whenever one was needed, it was necessary to rent it. We understand that other units are still rented when more than one patient needs such assistance at the same time.

"Anything that affects the health of the lungs and respiratory system is of primary importance to our Association. We are pleased that some of our funds could be used to upgrade the quality of respiratory care available to residents of our community."

Column Comments

With thousands of people moving into Clackamas County each year, we feel the need to review the educational programs of the Extension Service available to these newcomers and present residents as well.

The OSU Extension Service has been traditionally linked with agricultural production, and this situation still holds true. In addition, there are other areas in which the Extension Service performs an educational role. These areas include educational programs in 4-H, Home Economics, and Community Development designed to meet the needs of county residents. This column will mention some of the programs offered in Extension Home Economics.

Monday, June 4, the Extension staff will welcome a new member, Mrs. Marilyn Lunner. Mrs. Lunner will provide leadership in the broad area of Home Economics. At the heart of this educational program are 51 study groups involving 1200 women. During 1973-74 these ladies will receive intensive instruction on topics such as "Emerging Values of Youth," "Consumer Protection," "Herbs and Spices," and "What About Inflation?"

Mrs. Lunner will also work in the Tri-County area of Multnomah, Washington, and Clackamas counties as a project leader in other home economic fields as an area agent. This arrangement will benefit Clackamas County because Home Economists from Multnomah and Washington counties will present training and meetings covering a wide range of special subjects of interest to Clackamas County women.

An additional program planned for 1973-74 is a workshop for the prospective mobile home owner. This short course will answer many of the questions asked by investors interested in this type of housing.

Other special areas receiving attention of the home economics department include the young homemaker and programs for the aging. The young homemaker receives a newsletter on a regular basis with tips to help with the many household management problems facing this age group.

Census figures and other data indicate Clackamas County has a relatively large number of low income residents. With these statistics in mind, Clackamas County is being considered as an area to begin a program of Expanded Food and Nutrition. (EFNP) If this program is adopted, the county

will be in a favorable position to provide useful food and nutrition information to a relatively large number of people.

County residents can look forward to an active educational program of Home Economics and Family Living as we welcome Mrs. Lunner to the Extension Staff.
