Consumers list 73 complaints

There was a time when Oregon consumers were not quite sure which way to turn when they had problems with food products they had purchased or when contents of a packaged item were short of the weight claim.

Now they are turning to the Oregon Department of Agriculture's consumer officer, Dr. Jane Wyatt, who in May received a total of 73 complaints from consumers.

Hearing set on sockeye shad seasons

The opening of a sockeye season and reopening of shad fishing on the Columbia River, above and below Bonneville Dam, are the two main topics to be considered at a joint public hearing of the Fish Commission of Oregon and the Washington Department of Fisheries on Monday, June 18.

Sockeye salmon have begun to enter the Columbia River and counts at Bonneville Dam are expected to peak around the end of June. This year's run is not expected to be large and if any season is allowed, it will be of short duration. Since 1967, seasons for sockeye have lasted less than a week.

An unprecedented early run of shad in the Columbia River resulted in an early opening of the Gary Island to Bonneville Dam shad season. When the season closed on May 29, over 23,000 roe shad had been harvested. Reopening of this season and the establishment of a season above Bonneville Dam will depend on the abundance of shad and the necessity to protect summer chinook which might be in the same area.

The public hearing will convene on June 18 at 1:30 p.m. in the Public Service Building, Second Floor Auditorium, 920 S.W. Sixth Avenue, Portland. Persons wishing to present testimony or ask questions about a possible sockeye and shad season may do so orally at the hearing or by writing to the Fish Commission of Oregon, 307 State Office Building, 1400 S.W. Fifth Avenue, Portland, Oregon 97201.

Dr. Wyatt said investigation of the complaints showed that 44 of them were valid and 10 others were still being checked, while in six cases validity could not be determined. Eleven of the complaints were considered invalid and two of those received by the department were in areas where the department had no jurisdiction, but they were referred to the proper agencies.

Responsible for most of the complaints were contamination and adulteration of foods, labeling, packaging or advertising of a product and the quality of the food. Other complaints covered sanitation, spoilage of food, health and safety, economic cheat, short fill or measure and insufficient consumer information.

All-Arabian horse show set in Salem

This 27th Annual Show will be presented by the Arabian Horse Breeders Association of Oregon June 21-24.

Performances are scheduled for Thursday 7:30 p.m. Friday 1:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., Saturday 1 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., Sunday 1:30 p.m. Classes scheduled for the performances include Arab costume, cutting horse, jumpers, and driving classes.

Proceeds of the show support Lions service activities in the Salem area such as aid to the blind and partially sighted, youth projects, Devers Memorial Eye Clinic and the purchase of large type books for the Salem public library.
