

Sandy legion team ups record to 4 wins 1 loss

The Sandy American Legion baseball team fell to Reynolds Monday for their first defeat of the season. The team now has a 4-1 record after also picking up a win over Columbia Fence last week.

The Sandy team had only four hits in its 8-1 win over Columbia Fence, but they also took advantage of four errors by their opponents.

Jon Miller tossed a four-hitter and struck out 10 in posting the win.

The only run off Miller came in the third inning, but Sandy rallied to score three runs also in the third and that is all Miller needed to back his pitching.

The Sandy team added one insurance run in the fourth and then bombed the visitors with a four run fifth to put the game totally out of reach.

Keith Jensen was the top stick man for Sandy collecting a single and double and driving in two runs. Also getting two hits for Sandy was Larry Dahrens who collected two singles.

Others getting hits in the win were Mike Pullen and Jay Dodson. Meanwhile, Miller, Dan Turin and Dodson also drove in runs.

In the 6-2 loss to Reynolds, the Sandy team got only five hits and committed two errors. Miller again was the pitcher, this time getting the loss. He allowed two runs each in the first and third innings and then

allowed one run each in the fourth and fifth innings.

Five Sandy players each got one hit with Turin and Miller getting doubles. Turin also drove in one run.

Others getting hits for Sandy were Randy Moody, Dodson, and Dahrens.

Coach Glenn Smith now has his team ready to meet Putnam tonight there before coming home to meet Oregon City on Monday and then going to Clackamas on Wednesday night for games.

The Oregon City game begins at 5 p.m. while the other two games start at 6 p.m.

In the game with Scappoose, Sandy fell behind early as Scappoose collected two runs in the first inning. They scored on two walks and two Sandy errors.

Sandy picked up a run in the second on four straight walks to Farner, Dodson, Hudgeons and Mark Naylor.

Scappoose added a run in the third inning on an error and wild pitch.

The score remained 3-1 until the sixth when Sandy picked up two runs to tie the game on a single by Sheppard. His hit followed singles by Hudgeons and Dave Dillard and a walk to Frank Douglas.

In the last inning, Scappoose got the go-ahead run on two hits and an error.

Sandy then came to bat for their last chance and scored two runs to win the game.

The runs came on walks to Dodson and Hudgeons (he was replaced by pitch runner Meyers) and then Naylor singled in Dodson and Hayes followed with a single to score Meyers with the winning run.

Sandy will host Reynolds today at the Sandy high athletic field with the game starting at 6:30 p.m.

The Shad is here. June is Shad month on the Columbia. This fish is a strong and fast contender on light tackle and can give you as much trouble to land as a steelhead.

One of the best spots for this fish is the north side of Bradford Island at Bonneville. Short casts are all that is needed. Favorite lures these past few seasons have been small maribou jigs in white or yellow.

Shad lures change. Ten or twelve years ago it was Pippin Wobblers put out by the Pfeiffer Company. You never see Pippins these days. They may not make them any more. Other tiny wobblers such as the metalfly had their seasons of prominence and then faded away.

The Shad is a deeply built fish vertically but very thin from side to side. He has a tender

The 11-12 girls medley relay with Nancy Marsh, Jeanne Duff, Julie Parker and Barbie King, placed fifth.

Now that their successful Swim-a-thon has been completed, the Blue Marlin are busy preparing for their "AA" Invitational Meet which will be held at the pool this Saturday, June 16, beginning at 10 a.m.

The public is invited to drop by the pool and watch those marathon swimmers in competition with entrants from eight other clubs.

Wilderness users permits

Wilderness users are reminded they will need a permit this summer to enter seven of 14 wildernesses within the National Forests of the Pacific Northwest.

The reminder was issued by the U.S. Forest Service in advance of the start of this year's permit season on June 15. The permit system will remain in effect until November 15.

Included in the system for 1973 are the Eagle Cap, Mt. Jefferson, and Three Sisters Wilderness areas in Oregon, and Glacier Peak, Goat Rocks, Mt. Adams, and Pasayten Wildernesses in Washington. Regional Forester Theodore A.

Schlapfer said these are the most heavily used and the largest areas with the most serious management problems.

Permits will be issued in person and by mail by the National Forests where a Wilderness is located, except where a popular Wilderness portal is through an adjoining Forest. Mail applications can be obtained at any Forest Service office.

Use of the free permit will enable the Forest Service to advise visitors about specific regulations and measures being taken to protect the Wilderness environment of the areas to be visited.

Large salmon run reported

The fifth largest run of spring chinook salmon in the Columbia River since 1938 provided gill-net fishermen with an exceptional spring season harvest of 51,500 fish below Bonneville Dam. Last year's catch of 69,000 fish exceeded this year's by over 17,000, but the spring harvest was still the second best since 1965.

The 17-day spring season, which began April 25 and ended May 18, harvested about 20 percent of the upriver run of approximately 230,000 spring salmon. Steelhead made up a very small portion of the spring season catch with only 2,000 being harvested.

A total of 142,000 spring chinook made it past all lower

river commercial and sports fisheries to escape over Bonneville Dam and about 33,000 of these fish were captured by the Indian commercial setnet fishery. The Indian catch is well below last year's 43,000 fish, but is considerably above the 1968-72 average of 23,700. About 1,400 steelhead were also taken during the Indian fishery which ended May 31.

The remaining 109,000 spring chinook which eluded the commercial and lower Columbia sports fisheries are more than sufficient to provide adequate upriver spawning stocks. Escapement of these stocks into the Snake River set a new record with nearly 53,000 spring chinook passing over Little Goose Dam as of June 7.
