

Rain slows harvest activities in state

The Employment Division's Rural Manpower Service reported rain showers and cool weather have slowed or delayed some harvest activities.

The strawberry harvest is completed at Grants Pass and progressing in the Willamette Valley with adequate help except for a slight shortage at McMinnville where housing is scarce.

The cherry harvest is completed at Milton-Freewater and has started at Eugene, Salem and McMinnville with

adequate help, but no housing. The Dalles area cherry pickers expect to be short 400 pickers by June 18 and Hood River expects to be short 50 pickers by June 20. There is limited housing in both areas.

Grants Pass cherry harvest start has been delayed to June 22 and Hillsboro harvest is to start June 25. La Grande, July 1.

Asparagus harvests are completed at both Milton-Freewater and Pendleton. The pea harvests are continuing at Milton-Freewater

and Pendleton with a slight shortage of help at Milton-Freewater.
