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Kiwanis Centennial year Fly-in

Lots of food and fun will be on the menu Sunday, July 15, when the Sandy Kiwanis hold their 16th annual Fly-in breakfast.

The early morning affair will start at 7 a.m. at Rich's Airport in Sandy. Food will be available until 1 p.m. Kiwanis president Dale Nicholls said hotcakes, ham and eggs, orange juice, tomato juice, grapefruit juice, milk and coffee will be served.

The Fly-in is the biggest fund raising event of the year for the Sandy Kiwanis Club. People come from all over Oregon and Washington for the breakfast. "Rich" Wesselink, owner of the airport, expects planes to come in from Vancouver and several other out-of-state locations. In 1971, 37 planes with passengers came for the breakfast. Last year over 40 planes touched down at the Sandy Airport for the popular event.

The Breakfast theme will center around the Sandy and Barlow Trail Centennial year celebration. Olin Bignall, Fly-in Breakfast Chairman, is making arrangements for some special entertainment.

Proceeds from the breakfast are used for sponsorship and support of the Mt. Hood Kiwanis Crippled Children's Camp, Sandy High School Scholarship fund, Sandy area Christmas basket delivery and other charity programs.

Advance sale tickets for the breakfast are now being sold by all members of the Sandy Kiwanis Club.

The Portland Metropolitan Area Local Government Boundary Commission has slated a hearing on the dissolution of the district.

This water district covers the Kelso area west of the city of Sandy and east of the Boring Water District area.

The hearing has been set for 9 p.m. July 25 at the Multnomah County courthouse in Portland, room 680.

Cottrell issues pass voters

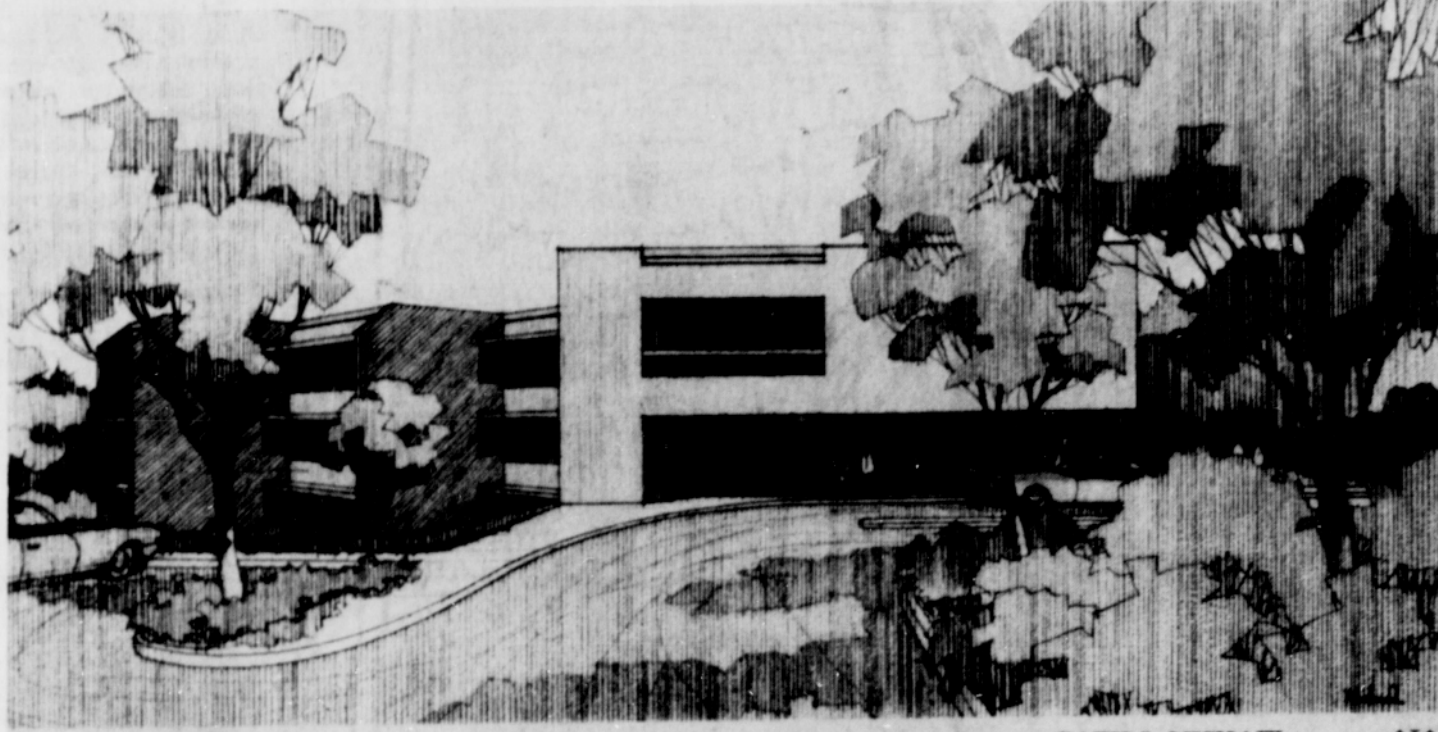
Voters in the Cottrell Grade School district approved both a budget for 1973-1974 and a building bond levy on Friday.

In an overwhelming favorable vote, the budget passed 80 Yes to 24 No and the building bond levy won 73 Yes to 31 No.

According to district principal, Mrs. Jean Lundy, the total number of voters (104) is one of the largest turnouts in recent years in the district.

The budget calls for \$168,068 outside the district's six per cent limitation and the bond issue was for \$335,000.

The bond would construct and equip four classrooms to house the sixth, seventh and eighth grades on property located to the south and adjacent to the school's baseball field. Also, a new gym and locker room facilities would be constructed according to Mrs. Lundy.

expected to begin on Aug. 1. The two got approval from the Sandy Ambulance Service Monday night to move the service to the complex when phase I is completed. The first building will also house a tow

truck service and a 24-hour answering service. The development will be located on 2.5-8 acres on the north side of Highway 26 and west of N. Bluff Rd.

Professional complex planned; new home for ambulance

A professional building complex and a new home for Sandy Volunteer Ambulance Service is slated for Sandy.

Mike Nicholson and Don Armintrout, both of Sandy, announced plans this week to construct a 30,000 square foot professional complex and a building to house the ambulance service. The complex will be located on the north side of Highway 26 on 2.5-8 acres (the old Bruns property) west of N. Bluff Rd.

Monday night the ambulance board gave approval to the two for moving of the service from its present home at the Sandy Fire Department to the new building when it is completed.

Construction is expected to start on Aug. 1, according to Nicholson. He is a contractor and will build the complex.

The complex is expected to be developed in three stages within one year, with the ambulance building being constructed

first.

Besides the ambulance service the building will also house a 24-hour answering service and a tow truck service.

Phase two will complete one half of the professional complex and phase three will complete the complex. The complex will include parking for 99 cars and landscaping with a water fountain and a flag pole area.

The complex will be called 26 East, according to Armintrout.

Armintrout and Nicholson are both members of the volunteer ambulance force and also the fire department volunteers.

Plans call for updating of the ambulance service once it is moved to its new location. According to Armintrout, some of the upgrading will include dual battery system, saddle tank gas system, air horn, new and complete first aid equipment and hopefully a new ambulance within one year.

"When we get the new ambulance, the old rig will remain as a back up rig," said Armintrout.

When the ambulance service changes location, it will still remain a volunteer operation and new volunteers are always needed.

All members of the service are now being trained in Emergency Medical Treatment (EMT).

The rates of the service will basically remain the same because it is a volunteer operation, according to Armintrout.

The buildings will be constructed in heavy wood with a rustic modern look, according to Nicholson. Air conditioning and janitorial service will also be provided.

The developers are currently seeking occupants for the complex.

County building permits down

Building permits were down in Clackamas County in May, 1973, compared to May, 1972, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business and Economic Research has reported.

In May, 1973, the total was \$4,429,350 compared to \$5,663,107 in the same month last year.

Building permits from 147 identical reporting centers in Oregon totalled \$69,892,650 in May, 1973. This was 6.4 per cent lower than in May, 1972.

The state total in May, 1973, included \$39,056,644 for 2,369 new dwelling units; \$20,488,059 for new nonresidential construction; and \$10,347,947 for additions, alterations, and repairs to existing structures.

For the same month last year, the \$74,680,298 total of permits was composed of \$45,103,763 for 2,953 new dwelling units; \$21,417,322 for new nonresidential construction; and \$8,159,213 for additions, alterations, and repairs to existing structures.

Voters to get second chance on fire budget

The Sandy Rural Fire District will make a second try for an operating budget on Aug. 1. The district will re-submit the same budget which the voters defeated on June 26.

This was the unanimous decision of the fire district's budget review committee last Thursday.

The proposed 1973-1974 budget of \$103,713 was defeated by a vote count of 276 No to 235 Yes. This budget will again be voted on with the poll open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the fire hall.

Of the total budget, the district is seeking \$59,687.56 outside its six per cent limitation.

No public meeting has been set to discuss the budget, but residents are urged to attend the next fire board meeting on July 10 if they wish to discuss budget items. The meeting will be at the fire hall in Sandy starting at 8 p.m.

Passage of this budget along with the approval of the recent bond issue will give the district the financial base needed to carry out the fire prevention needed in the district, according to the review committee.

Police report solving three burglaries

Sandy police have cleared three recent burglaries with the lodging of a 17-year-old juvenile with county authorities.

He is a former Sandy resident now living in Portland, according to police chief Fred Punzel.

The youth is said to have been involved in the burglaries of the Mt. Hood Fruit Market, Ernie Beers Tire Center and Ogden's Variety Store.

Another youth said to also have been involved in the burglaries, is currently in the Wasco county jail on a charge of criminal activities and drugs.

Then on the final weekend of July, the Pioneers of the area will get into the act with the annual picnic of the Sandy Pioneer Association.

This pot-luck event is slated for the Pioneer Park on July 29 beginning at 12:30.
