Cheap food out of sight July 4 picnic

I have indicated in other news releases that the day of cheap food is just about over for the American consumer. Events in the poultry industry during the last 14 days tend to bear this out and paint an even darker picture for the months ahead with regard to supply and price of poultry products.

I'm talking particularly about the Presidential price freeze of June 13th and how it is being interpreted by the U.S. Cost of Living Council. The freeze was intended to stabilize food prices but the reverse is likely to be true.

When the freeze was announced, the poultry industry felt that this might be good news with possible higher prices to producers but it became apparent rather quickly that the freeze applied to the distributors and wholesalers with their prices fixed at the June 1-8 level. When this was realized, the poultry industry recognized the seriousness of the problem because both broiler and eggs were affected at prices averaging below the cost of production during June 1-8.

Another factor was the price freeze has no apparent effect on feed grain and soybean meal prices which are at their highest level in history. To make matters worse, the cost of poultry feed has climbed higher because of the large sales of soybean and corn to Russia, Japan, and other nations. This movement of grain has practically doubled the cost of producing a pound of broiler meat or a dozen eggs in the past eight months.

What will be the result of these attempts to hold retail prices and at the same time increase production? Unfortunately, poultry producers are looking at this situation and they will probably react by cutting production of broilers by 15 per cent or more. This means that the consumer will have fewer broilers from which to choose and if this is the case, the consumer will probably pay more for the product.

Egg producers are in a more

serious position because they generally operated at losses between 1970-1972 with only a slight amount of black ink showing in the first half of 1973. Reports I have heard from leaders in the egg industry show that many producers are losing from 4-5c per dozen on eggs that they are now producing.

All of these facts are hard to understand as consumers, however, we must remember that a producer must be stimulated to produce eggs or meat. The best stimulation is some assurance of a possible profit. Under the regulations now in effect, many poultrymen and other producers will likely decide not to produce a crop or livestock rather than to produce at a loss.
