

Giants collect two wins behind strong pitching

The Sandy Giants behind the pitching of Dubbie Hayes and Walt Hudgeons took two games this week. They defeated Lynch 5-3 and David Douglas No. 2 7-3.

In the game with Lynch, Hayes went the distance giving up three runs and three hits.

He had a no-hitter going into the sixth inning, but two walks followed by Lynch's first hit scored one run and ended his bid for a no-hitter.

Lynch also scored their final two runs in the seventh inning on a walk and two hits.

Sandy started the scoring in

the second inning on a hit by Randy Farmer, one walk to Ron McQueen and a double by Hudgeons. Both Farmer and McQueen scored on the double.

Sandy scored another run in the fourth on a hit by Jeff Martin, walks to McQueen and Mark Naylor and an error which scored Martin.

The local team also scored single runs in the fifth and sixth innings.

In the fifth, hits by Chris Truesdale, Martin, and a walk to McQueen loaded the bases. Truesdale scored on a fielder's choice. The others were left

stranded. In the sixth, Hayes and Frank Douglas walked, followed by a hit by Lane Sheppard scoring Hayes.

In the game with David Douglas, the strong pitching of Hudgeons was a key to the win. Hudgeons went the distance giving up three runs on three hits.

DD scored one in the fifth and two in the sixth innings.

Sandy got the scoring off to a start with three runs in the first one, five walks to Hayes, Douglas, Sheppard, Farmer, and Hudgeons. Then Martin hit

a sacrifice to score the final run of the inning.

Sandy got another run in the second on hits by David Dillard, Hayes and Douglas.

The local team scored again in the third on a walk to Hudgeons and hits by Dillard, Naylor and Martin.

In the fourth, Sandy scored two runs on walks to Sheppard, Farmer, Hudgeons and Martin and a sacrifice by Dodson.

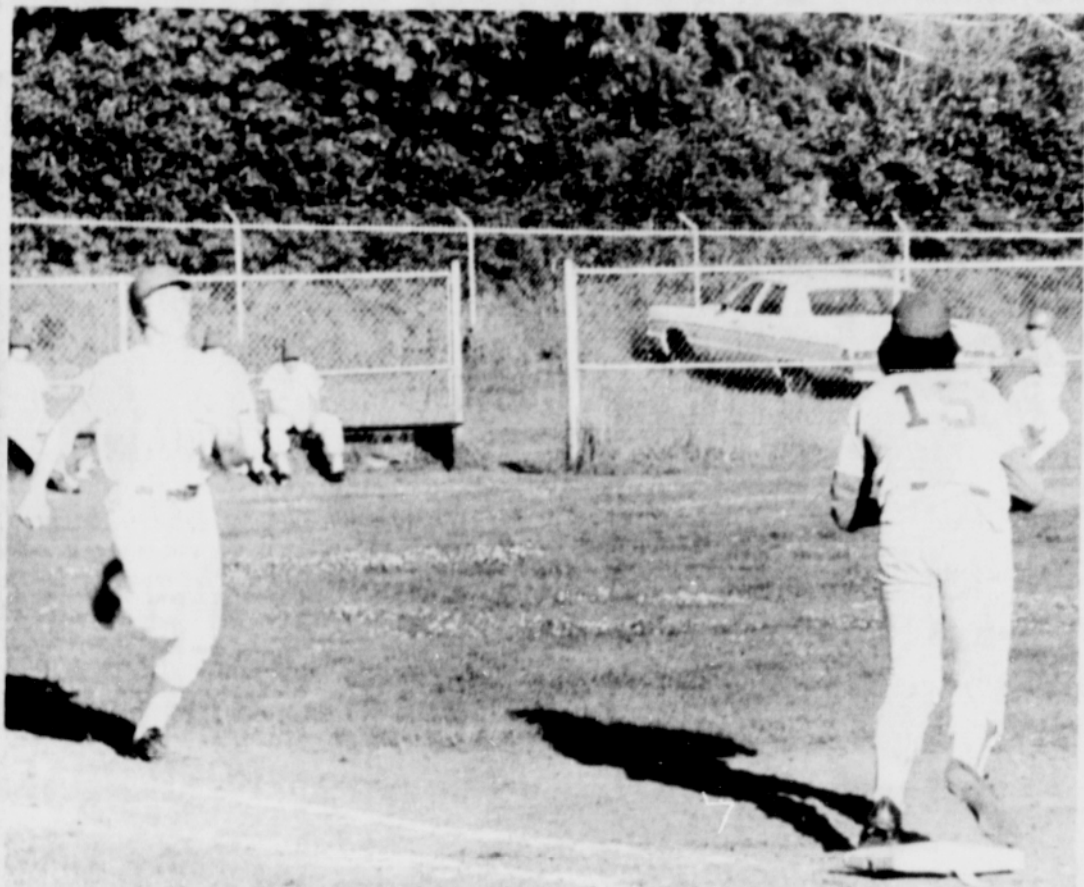
Sandy made two double plays and picked off four runs at the plate in the win over DD.

High Cascade buck hunt open to only 5,000

The Oregon State Game Commission is reminding hunters that the High Cascade buck hunt is open to only 5,000 permit holders this year. These permits must be applied for on the deer permit application card that comes with the general deer tag.

Hunters must make a choice between applying for the High Cascade hunt or applying for a permit to harvest a doe in a management unit or permit season, since the same application must be used for both. Some hunters are evidently confused about this and have

been sending in applications on the wrong form, according to staff biologist Don Wilt.

The hunt was restricted to permit holders this year to reduce the hunter congestion that was observed in many areas last year and to maintain the hunt as a high quality wilderness experience.

Area boundaries remain the same as last year.

The deadline for applications for the High Cascade buck permits as well as for general deer permits is Aug. 7 at 5 p.m. The drawing will be held on Aug. 17.

New brochure for golfers

A golfer wishing to play all of Oregon's golf courses would have to play a distance approximately equivalent to the length of Interstate 5 from border to border in Oregon—that is if he managed to avoid extensive trips in the rough.

The 306 miles—or 538,630 yards—of fairways are listed in the newly revised version of "Oregon Golf Courses", a brochure produced by the Travel Information Section of the State Highway Division. Information on 128 courses, listed and described by location, number of holes, length of course, and whether public or private, is contained

in the brochure according to Victor B. Fryer, travel information director.

The total includes 101 public courses and 27 private courses. Of these, 54 are full 18-hole courses. In addition, the list includes 71 nine-hole courses. New courses included in the brochure this year are Charbonneau at Wilsonville, Black Butte Ranch near Sisters, Cedar Links at Medford, Kah-Nee-Ta Resort near Warm Springs, Willow Run at Boardman and Cedar Bend north of Gold Beach.

The brochure is illustrated with a front cover scene of the forests and Three Sisters

mountains viewed from Tokatee golf course on the McKenzie River and a back cover scene of the seascape view across Neah-Kah-Nie golf course.

Copies of the brochure are available free of charge from the Travel Information Section, State Highway Building, Salem 97310, or from State and chamber of commerce information centers and at most golf courses.
