

Rules, regulations proposed for state day care programs

New rules and regulations for Oregon's day care programs will be brought to public hearing in Portland, Tuesday, July 10 at 2:00 p.m. in Room 338 of the Smith Memorial Center, Portland State University, according to Don Miller, administrator of the Children's Services Division.

The proposed new rules and regulations governing day care centers contain no major changes, but do allow more flexibility in their application. The group home (facilities caring for 5-12 children) day

care regulations have been separated from the regulations dealing with day care centers to make them more applicable to a small operator and to make it possible for low income persons and those with limited experience and training to enter the field of day care. The proposed regulations for the care of infants and toddlers in day care centers are new to the state of Oregon. They were developed to offer protection to

the very young child who is placed in a group setting. The ratio of adult to child is higher than in a center caring for older preschoolers to assure individual attention. The new procedures proposed by a 14-member day care advisory committee, following a series of meetings last September. They affect all day care providers who care for more than four children other than their own.

Written and oral testimony will be accepted by Hearings Officer Duane Shimpach. Miller said. Written testimony must be mailed to Shimpach no later than July 6 at 5:00 p.m. at the Children's Services Division, 516 Public Service Building, Salem, Oregon 97310. Copies of the proposals may be obtained upon request from Shimpach's office and will be provided at the hearing, Miller said.

Senior citizen task force hears reports

In a meeting of the Clackamas County Senior Citizens Council Task Force last Thursday, at Clackamas Community College, three major committee reports were accepted: Communications, Transportation, and Multi-Purpose Senior Centers.

The Communications Committee's first priority recommendation is a central, toll-free, 24-hour telephone offering information, referral and follow-up for senior citizens in Clackamas County. Other recommendations of the Communications Committee include an Outreach program to find elderly persons in need of services and a Telephone Reassurance program which would insure that older persons living alone would be contacted regularly to insure their safety. The Transportation Committee's report called for safe, reliable, affordable, and convenient transportation be provided for senior citizens. The recommendations call for a vehicle in each population center of the County to be run on a demand basis using volunteers as drivers.

The Senior Citizens Committee stressed the need for and importance of multi-purpose senior centers in the County to act as contact points for senior citizens. These centers would be the impetus for making needed services available and accessible to the elderly.

These reports will become part of a Comprehensive Service-Delivery Plan for Clackamas County Senior Citizens, which is scheduled to be completed in September of this year. The plan will be made available to help local governments provide social services for the elderly. Older Americans Act money will be available during the upcoming years to help implement parts of the plan.

In other business at the meeting, Dr. Hakanson, Chairman, appointed Myrle Mahan of West Linn, Frank Lahoney of the Social Security office, and Paul Roth of Canby to serve with him and Vice-Chairman Charles Needham of Lake Oswego on the Task Force Executive Committee.

The Task Force heard two agency presentations: (1) Social Security by Frank Lahoney, Branch Manager (2) Veterans' Office by Ed Miles, Veterans Service Officer. The next meeting of the Task Force will be held July 19, 1973 at 1:30 p.m. at Clackamas Community College in the Barlow Hall Board Room. Visitors are welcome.

Bank debits increase in county

Bank Debits for the twenty-three reporting banks including Clackamas counties were up in May, 1973, compared to May, 1972, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business and Economic Research has reported.

Debits for May, 1973, totaled \$244,817,000. For April, 1973, the total was \$227,253,000 and for May, 1972, the total was \$191,775,000.

Oregon, with 415 banks reporting, had a percentage increase of 3.8 in May, 1973, as compared with April, 1973, and a 37.0 percentage increase in May, 1973, compared with May, 1972.

Total bank debits for May, 1973, came to \$6,714,189,000. For April, 1973, the total was \$6,397,633,000 and for May, 1972, the total was \$6,362,465,000.

Meat supply, prices tied to feed costs

Persons who would understand what is going on with meat prices and supplies must look at the supply and price of feed grains available to livestock and poultry producers, says Stephen C. Marks, Oregon State University Extension agricultural economist.

"Rising feed prices and uncertainty of feed supplies forcing revision of producers' plans for feeding more cattle, hog and poultry producers are holding back for the same reasons," Marks points out in the new Farm and Market Outlook circular published by the OSU Extension Service.

The prospective grain and forage situation means that meat producers are likely to find the cost of production will remain high. Prices of feed grains, soybean meal, and hay are not likely to get cheaper anytime soon, Marks believes.

With the current ceiling on meat prices, producers of feeder livestock can expect buyer resistance to current asking prices for feeder cattle, pigs, and lambs, he adds. Marks observes that feed grains and protein foods have been sharing in the speculative grain market situation this spring. "A normal occurrence whenever the world supply of a major grain diminishes or demand increases significantly."

Feed grain stocks are significantly lower than a year ago, down 6 percent on April 1 in the United States alone. Practically all of the remaining supply is privately owned.

Barley and oats stocks held in Pacific Northwest storages are low also. The generally smaller grain stocks plus delays in spring planting and the uncertainty of 1973 feed grain crops sparked a price rise this spring that was second only to the sharp advance recorded last fall, the economist notes.

Turning to the hay situation, Marks notes that 1973 is a critical year for both producers and users due to high feed grain prices, the drought, and continuing strong demand for hay.

Because of the tight supply-demand situation, spring prices declined less than usual this year. Marks believes that Oregon alfalfa hay prices probably will average higher this year than ever before.
