

County planners pass building moratorium

Are you planning to build in the near future? Forget it starting on Sept. 1, if you live in Clackamas County.

The Clackamas County Planning Commission voted Monday night to place a 90-day moratorium on all building applications which normally go to the planners starting Sept. 1.

The action was taken at the urging of Commissioner Kirk Braun. He made the motion after county planning director James Hall complained that his staff was being deluged by building applications

rather than having time to do "planning" functions and studies.

Hall said he was seeking direction of the commission in light of the county commissioners deletion of four staff positions from the present fiscal year budget. He said the commissioners had failed to hire a new staff planner and secretary following the resignation of his planning assistant.

Hall stated the planning department had been directed by the commissioners to do 26 independent studies on planning functions and building trends in the county. But

at the same time, only one staff member was available to do the work since the rest of the staff was busy with applications.

Hall told the planning commission needed planning for the county was bogged down because of all the application work his staff must do.

In the moratorium motion, commissioner Braun called for a halt to all consideration of planning applications for 90 days to allow the staff time to complete studies assigned and to allow the Planning Commission a period to revise and review the proposed comprehensive plan and the

Hoodland plan.

If an adequate budget is received, the moratorium can be lifted, according to Braun.

The vote on the motion was four to three in favor. Voting against the motion were commission chairman Richard Benson, and commissioners Ray Novotny and Leighon Perkins.

Following the passage of the motion, the commission is now establishing dates for completion of planning studies by the planning staff.



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Sandy youth cleared of assault

A lie detector test and other evidence has now proved that a Sandy youth was not implicated in injuries which sent an 82-year-old Oregon City resident to the hospital last week.

According to the Oregon City police, following an intensive investigation into the incident, the 15-year-old Sandy youth was found to be telling the truth.

The youth had escaped from the Clackamas County Juvenile authorities and when authorities had searched for him they found Frank Schrupp, 82, who had been injured. The coincidence led officials to believe the youth had assaulted Schrupp.

Schrupp was treated and released from the hospital after receiving treatment for hand and facial lacerations. He had been found bleeding profusely on a gravel road in Oregon City.

A police spokesman said a later analysis of the injured indicated he had merely slipped and fallen.

Information supported the youth's statement that he had already left for Milwaukie when the incident had happened.

A lie detector test was administered last Thursday to the youth, and it supported his statement.

The juvenile is still in custody on charges of burglary and robbery, according to the Juvenile Department.

The 16th Annual Sandy Kiwanis Club Fly-In Breakfast will be held this Sunday starting at 7 a.m. at Rich's Airport north of Sandy. The event is expected to attract an exceptionally large crowd.

Many Kiwanians and their wives will be dressed in the styles of the 1800's as this year's event will carry out the Sandy Centennial Year theme.

Olin Bignall, program chairman, announced that there will be entertainment for the enjoyment of all who attend. The 'Sky Knights' will put on a show of flying remote control planes.

A special entertainment attraction will be the performance of "Diamond Lil" and Her Four Judges. This 'surprise' entertainment group is expected to perform at least twice during the morning hours. It is reported that Diamond Lil is also known as, Lillian McLain, a court reporter. Other members are also known as, Circuit Court Judges P. K. Hammond and Winston Bradshaw; Gladstone Municipal Judge, Phil Ringle along with one Judge George Howeler. The Night Crawlers popular music group will play old and new favorites.

Dale Nicholls, president of the Sandy Kiwanis Club, pointed out to the Sandy Post that the Fly-In Breakfast is the largest single club fund raising event of the year. All club members, and their wives as well, work very hard to make the Fly-In Breakfast a success. The funds derived from the event go towards the support of the Mt. Hood Kiwanis Crippled Children's Camp, Sandy High School scholarships, Sandy area Christmas basket delivery and many other charity programs.

Nicholls said, 'The support given to the Sandy Kiwanis by all of the people in our town and for miles and miles around has always just been tremendous. We expect to serve well over 1,100 breakfasts. Without this kind of support, it would be impossible for us to perform the community service and youth projects that we do each year.'

Law suit, camping park test county Natural River measure

The Clackamas Natural Rivers Act area approved by Clackamas County voters last November is now coming under attack.

First, last week Construction Aggregate Inc., Oregon City, and eight county property owners have filed suit challenging the legality of the act.

Second, the county commissioners were to hear a proposal Wednesday by the Bonnie Lure Development Group of Portland for plans to develop a 500-unit camping park inside the Natural Rivers area.

The suit by the construction firm and property owners was filed in Clackamas County Circuit Court. The suit claims the mandate of county residents is "void, invalid and unconstitutional."

Proponents of the river area, passed by over 56,000 county residents through an initiative measure, had been expecting some form of legal action challenging the land use and building restrictions on the 25-mile section of the Clackamas River area.

Meanwhile, the proposed camping site would be located at the confluence of Eagle Creek and the Clackamas River.

The 100-acre site is approximately seven miles downstream from Estacada.

Results of the commission meeting were not known at press time, but the proponents of the camping park are expected to tell the commissioners that their plans are well within the restrictions included as part of the initiative.

The development is intended for

recreational and camper vehicle use and therefore is not in violation of the clause of the ordinance which prohibits trailer and mobile home parks from being placed in the natural river area, according to William Keys, Portland attorney. Another part-owner of the firm is Des Connall, former Multnomah County district attorney.

Several citizen groups have indicated that they may challenge the proposal on grounds that it would bring high-density development to the area. They also say that even though it is specified for recreational vehicle use, such vehicles still constitute mobile homes or trailers. The County Planning Department also is expected to oppose the development on the latter basis.

Marching band sought for parade

Plans for the Sandy Centennial parade are starting to take shape. Over 50 parade applications have been returned so far and more are expected by the July 20 final deadline.

The Sandy Civic Services, Inc. organization is responsible for the parade. This group also just completed sponsoring the July 4 celebration in Sandy.

The Centennial parade will be held on Aug. 11 starting at 10 a.m. The parade route in from the east end of Sandy down Proctor Ave. to the high school athletic field.

It is expected the parade will take up to

two hours to complete and while the street is blocked for the parade, traffic will be switched to two-way on Main St.

A meeting was held Sunday night to discuss the parade and it appears the only problem so far is the lack of a marching band.

No bands have been committed to appear yet, and the organization is now trying to locate a marching band which can appear.

A committee composed of Jerry Swails, Mrs. Florence Schmidt and Fred Punzel was established to work up the list of categories in which judging will be held.

The Sandy Centennial Committee will sponsor the awarding of prizes for the winners in each category.

Those entered in the parade will begin assembling between Glos Ford and the Immanuel Lutheran Church at 8 a.m. on parade day.

Judging will begin at 9 a.m. with the parade to begin promptly at 10 a.m.

It is still not too late to enter the parade. Applications should be made at any business in Sandy or mailed to Sandy Civic Services, Rt. 3 Box 584, Sandy, 97055.

BE AMERICAN — BUY AMERICAN BUILD AMERICA

More than ever before, I feel that it is time to give serious thought to our buying habits. We, unfortunately, have experienced, and we are experiencing a deficit balance of payments between what we export and what we import. This, definitely, is not a healthy situation and one that we should evaluate seriously.

In July, 1972, one short year ago, the German Mark was worth \$.3180 or say 32c. Today it is worth 43c. This is over an 11 cent or over a 35 per cent increase. At the same time, the Japanese Yen was pegged at \$.3375 last July. Today it is \$.385. In other words, our dollar has slipped drastically in the marketplace. Whenever we buy a foreign product it takes that many more dollars now to buy the same product than say a year ago. The same situation applies to traveling abroad. At the same time our American dollars are going overseas and are contributing to our deficit balance of payments.

I feel that we should all give serious thought that whenever we purchase foreign goods or services, just where are our dollars going and who is benefitting the most? Our prime concern should be the strengthening of our economy in relation to the rest of the world. Perhaps we should look at our hole card before we play the game.

If this sounds like a "flag waving" demonstration, I meant just that because "the country you help should be your own."
