What's Cooking?

This week I would like to share with you some excellent recipes which friends have recently given me. You will certainly want to add them to your files.

MEATLESS SPAGHETTI SUPPER

Saute 6 green onions (stems and onions) slowly in butter. Cook until clear.

Cook 1/2 package thin spaghetti in salted water until tender. Drain. Rinse with hot water.

Fold 1 cup cottage cheese (large curd) into hot spaghetti. Pour sauteed onions over mixture.

Serve with French sour dough bread sliced 1/2" thick, topped with shredded cheddar cheese. Melt in slow oven.

Dee serves this with a fruit salad and the combination makes a delicious supper.—From the files of Mrs. Robert Bailey, Alder Creek.

SHRIMP SALAD

1 large loaf sandwich bread. Cut off crusts. Spread with butter or margarine. Cut into cubes with electric knife or a regular sharp knife. Add 1 Tablespoon freeze-dried onions or 1 medium onion chopped, and 4 hard-boiled eggs, chopped. Put all in bread wrapper, shake and refrigerate

overnight. The next day add 3 cups mayonnaise (not salad dressing), 1 cup chopped celery, 2 cans little shrimp and either 1 can crab meat or tuna (6 1/2 oz. size). Mix well and refrigerate until ready to serve. Serves 12-18 generous servings. This is so good!—From the files of Mrs. Carl Carlson, Estacada. SIX BEAN CASSEROLE
Dice and fry 12 slices of good bacon. Add 1/2 large onion sliced and cook until clear. Spoon off drippings. Add:

1 cup brown sugar
1 cup ketchup
2 Tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
2 Tablespoons vinegar
2 teaspoon seasoned salt
Add:

1 can green beans
1 can wax beans
1 can garbanzo beans
1 can kidney beans
Drain all beans
Add:

1 can white lima beans, undrained
1 small can (13 oz.) B&M baked beans
1 can (4 oz.) mushrooms, w-juice if needed.

Put grated cheddar cheese on top and cover. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Serves 15-20.—From the files of Mrs. Robert Anderson, Salem. This is a wonderful vegetable dish to serve to a large group, or prepare for a pot-luck dinner. You hope there will be some left over for the next day.

SAUCE PAN CAKE
In sauce pan, bring to boil: 4 Tablespoons cocoa, 1 cup cold water, 1 stick margarine, 1/2 cup Wesson oil. Remove from stove and add: (Sifted together), 2 cups sugar, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder. Then add: 1/2 cup buttermilk, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 beaten eggs, and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour into greased and floured 9" x 13" pan. Bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes. Poke holes in the cake as soon as it is taken from the oven and is still hot. Ice with the following: Melt together 1/2

stick margarine, 2 Tablespoons cocoa, 3 Tablespoons milk, and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add 1 1/4 cups powdered sugar and 1/2 cup chopped nuts. ALMOND RICE
2 lbs. bulk pack sausage. Brown and pour off grease. Drain on paper towels. Brown 2 large chopped onions and 1 large bunch of chopped celery. Add 2 cups raw white rice, 3 packages Lipton's noodle soup mix, 1 cup sliced almonds, and 9 cups water. Pour into greased roaster. Baked covered at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Q. I have been receiving a monthly benefit from my deceased husband's Social Security earnings. I am going to marry a man who also is receiving Social Security. Will each of us continue to receive benefits?

A. Yes, but the amount will not be the sum of the amounts you are now receiving individually. The income provisions applicable under the old law were revised and improved by the Social Security Amendments Act of 1965.

Under the present law if you are both over 60 when you remarry, the amount your husband is receiving will remain the same. You will receive whichever of the following benefits is the larger: (1) One-half of the retirement benefit of your deceased husband - or (2) A wife's benefit based upon the earnings of your prospective husband.
