

Well-Care Child Clinic to begin here in fall

Sandy will be getting a Well-Care Child Clinic this fall.

Tom Klein of the Sandy Area Community Action Center reported the clinic will come to Sandy in September and run through May.

The clinic will be run through the State Health Department on the second Tuesday afternoon of each month providing there are enough children in need of the program.

Children ages one year to three years old are eligible for this clinic. The clinic is

located for 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. each day it is here.

The Action Center must supply two regular volunteers to help handle the children, an adequate waiting-reception room, examining room, and rest room.

The clinic will do limited immunizations but is primarily for health and growth evaluation. Fifteen children can be handled each month.

Pete Sulzbach and Clair Cox are heading up the local committee to establish the program in Sandy.

Port issue awaits high court ruling

The possibility of a vote on the tax base expansion plans of the Port of Portland must wait a decision on who is eligible to vote on the issue.

Three Clackamas County legislators announced plans last week to sponsor a petition drive to force a vote on the approved expansion of the port's tax base.

The legislature approved the expansion of the port into Clackamas and Washington counties without a vote of the people in the legislative session which just ended.

Sen. Dick Groener, one of the sponsoring legislators, said the issue may go before the Oregon Supreme Court before it goes to

the voters.

The attorney general's office has indicated that the high court should rule as to who should vote in the referendum election if signatures are gathered to place the issue on the November 1974 ballot.

The question is whether the referendum vote should include only Clackamas and Washington counties, Clackamas and Washington in addition to Multnomah, or the state as a whole.

Groener has indicated that 90 days allotted to gathering the 26,656 signatures to validate the referendum would not begin until after the high court had made its ruling.

Future projects at Timberline face cutback

Recent federal spending cutbacks will not delay the present east wing expansion project at Timberline Lodge.

The Federal House Appropriations Committee recently acted to not provide further funds for the lodge's renovation and expansion.

Work on the new addition on Mt. Hood was funded and started last year. Work resumed again several weeks ago. A spokesman for the lodge said the \$289,945 project would continue for the wing, kitchen, banquet, storage and service facilities, but further projects within the lodge were now in doubt.

The new wing will add about 19,500 square-feet of floor space to the lodge and will allow larger meetings for groups such as conventions.

Future plans which could be hindered by the cutbacks include housing for employees and a new day lodge.

Preliminary draft expected of city comprehensive plan

A preliminary draft of the comprehensive plan for the city of Sandy is expected on Tuesday.

The draft will be presented at the comprehensive planning meet set for 7:30 p.m. at the city hall.

The plan has been under development for several months and several public meetings have been held throughout its development.

The meeting July 17 is open to the public.

Committee starts study of police

An investigation and evaluation of the Sandy Police Department has now begun by a three man committee.

The investigation and evaluation was called for by Sandy mayor Melvin Haneberg early this year following several charges leveled at the police force by a former city police officer who was asked to resign.

The committee is under the direction of Bill Brooks chief of detectives with the Clackamas County Sheriff's department. The other members are Dan Clemens chief of the Gladstone police and Don Jones chief of the Milwaukie police force.

The committee started its work on July 9 and a report to the city council is expected by Aug. 10.

Meetings slated on Hoodland, county plans

The Mt. Hood Community Comprehensive plan is slated for a public hearing on July 20. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. at Welches Grade School and will be conducted by the Clackamas County Planning Commission.

This is an official hearing on this plan which has been over two years in the making.

Also slated for a meeting this week is the new citizen advisory committee to revise the county's overall comprehensive plan.

Duane Knapp of Sandy is the lone representative from this area on the committee of nine.

This committee will hold its first meeting on July 16 at the courthouse in Oregon City.

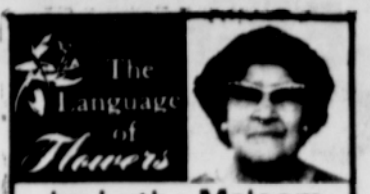
The planning commission has given this revision committee 90 days for its work on

revising certain areas of the comprehensive plan.

County gets funds

Burton W. Silcock, Director of the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, presented checks amounting to \$40,735,698.4 to representatives from Oregon's 18 O&C counties. Clackamas County received \$2,260,831.26.

The money is payment to the counties for their share of the revenue from timber sales on revested Oregon and California Railroad grant timberlands in western Oregon. The payment represents the counties' share of the revenue collected during the eleven-month period from July 1, 1972 to May 31, 1973.
